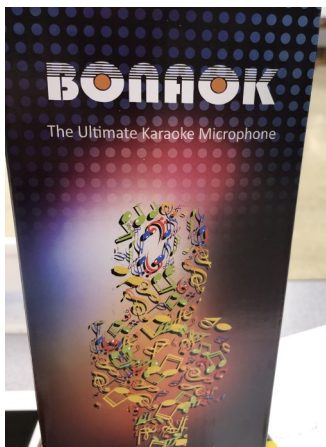
(carpool anyone?!). Registration opens June 1!

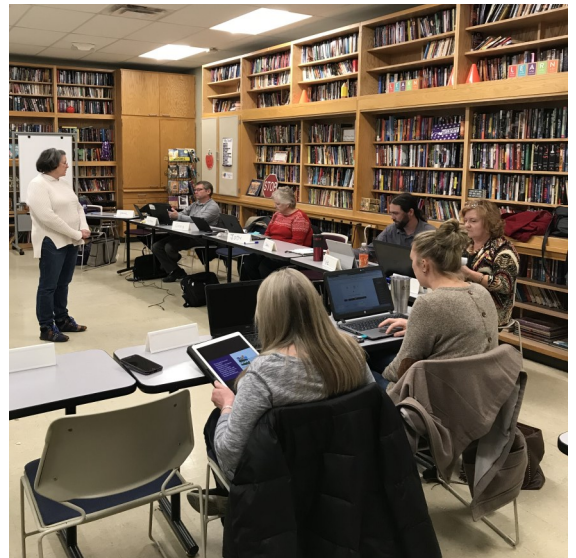
Make it a great summer! I am looking forward to seeing everyone at Annual Conference.

# ENDOWMENT UPDATE

The Endowment Board meet on May 20 to review the availability of Endowment Funds and to review the applications for Jim Lindquist Administrative Leadership Endowment and the ESP Professional Development Scholarships.

ESP Treasurer Debra Wood reviewed with the Board that there is currently a \$43.29 expendable balance in the Jim Lindquist Endowment Fund and \$8,642.78 of expendable funds in the Endowment Scholarship & Grand Fund. There are anticipated quarterly distributions of \$1,650.00 per quarter in 2019 but that is dependent upon the performance of the funds in the market. Jim Lindquist generously volunteered to provide an additional donation to allow an award of up to \$500 from the Jim Lindquist Fund.

With a number of the request being for tuition assistance and there being no real guidelines for awarding such, it was the consensus of the group to provide up to \$1,000 of assistance for Tuition for employees to take up to two classes per university policy.

With no guarantee of additional income, the group wanted to insure that some funds would be available for the August Innovative Programming proposals. It was the consensus of the group that we would set aside \$4,000 of the current \$8,642.78 to be available to fund the proposals due in August.

The Endowment received five request for a total of \$9,490.40. The following requests were granted by the Endowment Board:

\*\$1,000 to Patsy Maddy to attend the 2019 NAE4-HA Conference and Expo and present a program seminar with Pam Van Horn on Shooting Sports with \$500 coming from the Jim Lindquist Endowment and \$500 from the Extension Scholarship Fund.

\*\$1,000 to Erin Yelland, PhD, CFLE to attend The American Society on Aging Annual Conference: Aging in America.

\*\$1,000 to Chuckie Hessong for graduate studies toward a Masters in Community Development at Kansas State University.

\*\$1,000 to Sara Sawyer, MPH, RD, LD to attend "Nurturing the Richness of Lifelong Learning" the 2019 National Extension Association of Family & Consumer Sciences Annual Meeting.

\*\$1,000 to Cassie Homan for graduate studies toward a Masters in Adult Education and Leadership at Kansas State University.

The board received thank-you notes from Jamie Menon and Sharon Erickson-Fryback since the last meeting for scholarships received in the 2018-19 program
