# Team Up for Safety

# You Can Be a Star Player

Teamwork means working together for a common goal. For teamwork to take place on the job, workers have to agree on the goal and on ways to work together to achieve that goal. Take a few minutes now to consider how you and your co-workers can team up to achieve a safer working environment.

## Agree on the Goal

When a team goes out on the playing field, they have to agree on the goal to play the game. The same is true in the workplace. You and your co-workers have to agree that safety is a goal. And you must make sure that other goals do not conflict with your safety goal-for example, you don't want to cut corners on safety to meet a tight deadline. Do your part to establish safety as a goal: Talk about safety and its importance with your co-workers, both in safety meetings and on the job. Remember that your attitude and actions tell others how you feel about safety.


