Background of new CEO

- Native Kansan from Merriam, graduate of Shawnee Mission North High School
- 1965 graduate of Kansas State University, bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering
- Joined Air Force through K-State's ROTC program
- Received MBA from Auburn in 1977
- Co-chairs K-State's \$1 billion Innovation and Inspiration campaign with First Lady Mary Jo Myers

- Chairman of Joint Chiefs of Staff from 2001-2005
- Awards include Legion of Merit, French Legion of Honor and Presidential Medal of Freedom
- Pilot with more than 4,100 flying hours, including 600 combat hours
- Retired as 4-star General from USAF
- Serves on boards of major global corporations
- Consults internationally on security and leadership

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A unique university for Kansas

- Founded in 1863 as the nation's first operational land-grant school under the 1862 Morrill Act signed by President Lincoln
- Mission is to foster excellent **teaching, research**, and **service** that develop a highly skilled and educated citizenry necessary to advancing the well-being of Kansas, the nation, and the international community
- Salina campus opened in 1991 after merger with Kansas College of Technology. Renamed Polytechnic Campus in 2015
- Innovation Campus opened in Olathe in 2011
- Global Campus has provided distance education since 1966
- College of Veterinary Medicine provides global leadership in zoonotic diseases, comparative biomedical science, and food safety and security





Statewide reach

- Extension offices in all 105 counties
- Serve state's largest industries: aviation and agriculture
- 70% of wheat grown from varieties developed at K-State
- Nationally ranked aviation education and UAS programs



- Top choice of Kansas high school graduates
- Largest population of undergraduates in the state (19,472)
- More than 85,000 alumni living in the state
- 65,000 4-H youth participants
- 5,500 employees
- 71% of graduates remain in region (includes KC metro)

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Global impact

- World leader in food safety and food security, on the front line for our nation's bio-agro defense
- Chosen as the home for the Department of Homeland Security's \$1.2 billion National Bio and Agro-defense Facility
- United States Agency for International Development (USAID) invested more than \$100 million to establish K-State's four Feed the Future Innovation Labs
- Internationally recognized in sorghum, wheat and millet research
- Home of the world's only BioSecurity Level 3 agriculture research facility to address threats to plant, animal and food safety

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K-State 2025 after 5 years

- Record highs in research expenditures, student body diversity, and freshman-tosophomore retention and six-year graduation rates
- The number of doctorates awarded increased
- Raised over \$900 million in private fundraising during the past five years to advance our K-State 2025 vision and are now nearing \$1 billion goal
- Endowment pool increased, with our ranking improved from 77 to 66

- Highest composite ACT score for freshmen (25.1) in university history
- Freshman-to-sophomore retention rate a record 85.11 percent this year (83.45 percent Fall 2015)
- Multicultural students (3,651) make up more than 15 percent of our student body

 3 small town in the nation for businesses and careers


 With three national and eight state Carnegie/CASE Professor of the Year winners, K-State ranks in the Top 10 of all public and private universities






Efficiency initiatives

- Sustainability
 - Upgraded infrastructure with new chiller plant and building controls
- · Operational efficiencies
 - Collaborate with Regents universities in purchasing and financial reporting
 - Implemented paperless processing to eliminate routing times, reduce paper use and increase tracking ease
- Automated the hiring process and reduced time to approve job openings to under two days on average

- Consolidation and centralization of campus resources
 - Created shared services functions in major administrative areas to increase productivity while reducing headcount through attrition
- Technology improvements
 - Campus computer labs converted to virtual desktop, allowing centrally managed labs and reduced hardware costs
- Consolidated IT and support functions for K-State Research and Extension with the central university unit, reducing headcount and standardizing software programming protocols

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Effects of budget cuts

- Unable to provide compensation increases to faculty and staff; state has not provided block grant funding for salary increases since FY09
- Reduced hours and staff, including students, at library and art museum
- Discontinued Academic Excellence grant program
- Reduced number of students employed in academic and administrative areas
- Reduced number of graduate teaching assistants, resulting in increased class sizes
- Delayed critical cybersecurity updates and technology hardware
- Reduced number of academic advisors

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Budget request

- Provide stable funding for higher education, Kansas State University, K-State Research and Extension, and Kansas State Veterinary Medicine
- 2. Restore 2017 allotments

- Kansas State University: \$5,219,623

- K-State Research and Extension: \$1,348,010

- K-State Veterinary Medicine: \$509,103
