Used floodplain forest edge and savanna, not mapped - proximity to human habitation more
Nesting in flooded dead trees.
nested high in smaller structures.

Associated with cultivation.

Found in feed lots, barns, animal sheds, and grain storage bins, also croplands.

Found in farmland habitat.

Breeding habitat closely associated with farmland and areas of cultivation.

Croplands may aid overwinter survival.

Most abundant in the grain producing regions.

Found in cropland.

associated with farm buildings.

Nest in nest boxes placed relatively near buildings.

Generally found in areas near human habitation.

Breeds around human habitation. Will use nest-box.

Nest in hole or crevice in or near buildings.

Found close to human habitation in towns and farmsteads.

Found in cities.

Found in commercial areas of cities.

Found in residential areas of towns and cities.

Found in urban and residential areas.

Breeding habitat closely associated with urban and residential areas.

Breeding habitat closely associated with urban and residential areas.

Use buildings, and nest boxes.

Live in areas of human habitation. Nest on buildings and come to backyard feeders.

Close association with human settlement. Birds of farmsteads and towns. Nest in nest boxes. Nesting observed in farmsteads in northeastern Kansas.

Established in cities.

Closely associated with human settlement. Use nest boxes.

Found in rural residence.

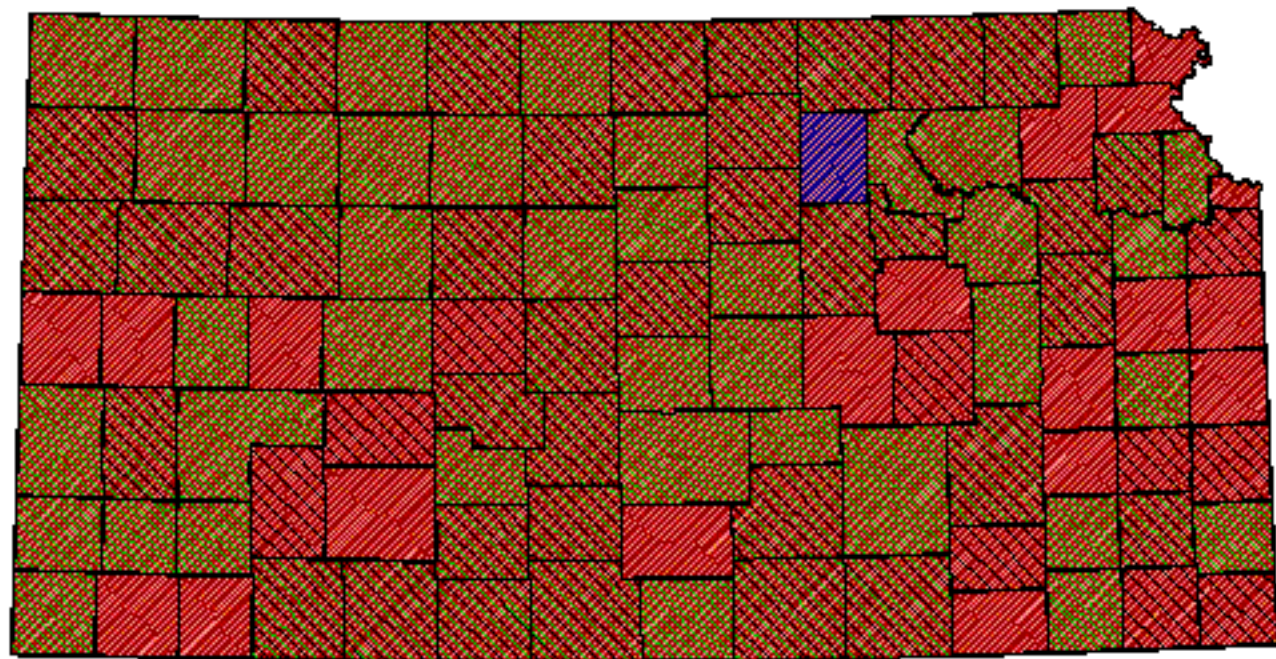
