Power vs. Force

Nonviolence Examples are becoming numerous: Blessed Unrest is a good start. Three Cups of Tea, Gregg Mortenson is one case study at the global level. Gustavo Dudamel's Venezuelan Youth Orchestra is another. Hope in the Dark, Rebecca Solnit shares contemporary examples. The various "pay it forward" stories usually involve nonviolent action with the aim of making a system healthier. The notion of "gamifying" or creating better behavior through positive reinforcement is an intriguing notion (see Gabe Zichermann, co-author of the book *Game-Based Marketing for example*). *Gratefully: look at the news! Egypt, Tunisia, for example.*
