## K-State Programs

### **Faculty-led Humanities Summer Program** <http://www.kstate.edu/oip/students/index.htm>

Every summer, a Kansas State faculty member leads students on a three-week program in Italy. This program usually travels to Rome, Venice, and Florence, and may include other locations. Students may choose one or two classes from the fields of English Literature, Modern Languages, and Philosophy. Students should investigate and sign up for these programs in the fall.

## K-State Exchanges \*Out-of-state students pay in-state tuition!\*

### **ISEP exchanges, Italy** <http://www.isep.org>

Through ISEP, students with at least four semesters of Italian language can pay tuition, fees, room and board to Kansas State while attending one of four Italian universities.

### **Università de Bologna, MAUI exchange**

Through K-State's membership in the MAUI consortium, students can spend a semester at one of the oldest universities in the world. Students must have intermediate-level Italian, and will pay tuition and fees to Kansas State.

## K-State Affiliations

### **Consortium of Universities for International Studies in Paderno del Grappa, Italy** <http://www.cimbaitaly.com>

This program is especially designed for upper-level students in business, journalism, and mass communications. The town of Paderno del Grappa is nestled in the foothills of the Dolomite mountains, in the Veneto region. The location of the campus offers the cultural experience of living in a small Italian community while providing direct access to the well-known art and history treasures of the Veneto, which contains the major cities of Venice, Padua, Vicenza and Verona. Travel time -- two week-long breaks and three long weekends -- is built into the program so students can explore Europe on their own. Convenient rail connections from Venice allow weekend visits to locations in Italy, France, Germany, Switzerland, and many other countries. A full range of business and economics core courses and electives, as well as required and elective courses in journalism and communication studies, are taught in English, and Italian language classes are offered as well.

API offers programs in Florence at Florence University of the Arts and Lorenzo de'Medici School. In Rome, you can study at John Cabot University. Or, try something different and study in Sicily at the Mediterranean Center for Arts and Sciences. All of these locations offer many classes in English in a wide variety of subjects, including the sciences. In Florence, you can take classes on Italian Cuisine and Wine Appreciation in addition to your academic classes, while in Sicily, you can take non-credit electives in sailing, snorkeling, scuba and more!
