Concert Band Program Notes

Keystone (2023).......JaRod Hall (b.1991)

For many years, I was a band director in Frisco ISD, a prosperous place tucked away in the northern Dallas-Fort Worth Metropolitan area of Texas. A former fellow Frisco colleague of mine, Ben Kelly, approached me one day about writing a piece dedicated to Dr. Daryl Trent, a pioneer of Frisco Fine Arts. Dr. Trent was a strong catalyst for the growing success and wonderful arts-rich culture of the community and as such, the middle school where Ben teaches (Trent Middle School) was named after him. Ben and I were band director neighbors in that our students shared fences and streets while attending separate schools. He let me know that Dr. Trent sure did love his marches – particularly those of Gustav Holst. My mission to create a piece in his honor couldn't have been any clearer.

As I searched for a word that could accurately describe Dr. Trent's legacy, I happened upon "keystone," which in architecture describes the final piece installed in an arch – locking the entire structure together. The keystone is the central component of a structure on which it entirely depends. Because of the keystone in an arch, the structure can bear weight, stand tall, and endure the elements. In many ways, Dr. Trent was the keystone of Frisco ISD Fine Arts.

The piece loosely follows the same format of the march from Holst's *Second Suite in F*, a favorite of Dr. Trent's: a short introduction, fanfare section, lyrical section at the same tempo, a trio that modulates to minor and 6/8, and a repeat to the top. This piece modernizes Holst's approach, however, with the inclusion of a coda that brings the piece to a triumphant finish. Additionally, more sections and different consorts are featured: the introduction features battery percussion, the trumpets take the lead with a bugle call that announces the first theme, the clarinet-horn-euphonium color sweetly introduces the lyrical secondary theme, the woodwind choir showcases the lilting compound-duple section in C minor (while the brass choir calls back to the bugle theme), and the coda can only be described as a truly cinematic, firework finish to the whole work.

Program note from the composer – JaRod Hall

Sunscapes was commissioned by the Florida Bandmasters Association for its 2017 Nine Star Honor Band. This work represents the lively nature of the state of Florida. It opens with a brilliant and majestic section highlighting its bright and vibrant culture. This section is followed by a flowing melody that represents the calming winds and consistent breeze of the state. Dance is a large part of Florida's culture, especially in its southern region. The 7/8 rhythm allows the piece to experience an Afro-Latin style dance movement. The choral/hymn section is based on the "Florida Song," which is a traditional school song of Florida A&M University, located in Tallahassee. The work then reverses itself until it arrives at the opening statement with a driving conclusion.

Program note from the composer – Chandler Wilson

While serving in the Belgian army during World War I, Pieter Leemans was asked by his regimental commander to compose a march. Several attempts were made, but he was unable to complete the project. Later, during World War II, a group of Belgian paratroopers, once again, asked him to write a march. Revisiting his original attempts, he was able to quickly write a piece, *March of the Belgian Paratroopers*, that has long been recognized as one of the great marches of the wind band repertoire. It is both unique in design and certainly very pleasing to the ear.

Concert Band Program Notes

Starry Ocean is a musical journey that takes listeners deep into the depths of the ocean, capturing the alluring spectacle of marine life as it mirrors the mystical allure of a star-filled sky. The narrative in the music seeks to depict the enchanting undersea landscape that resembles Van Gogh's "Starry Night." The piece begins with a tranquil, serene depiction of the undersea world, gradually building in complexity as the marine life becomes more active and vibrant. The music reflects this flurry of activity within this undersea cosmos, creating a soundscape that is as intriguing as the bioluminescent creatures in the deep ocean. Starry Ocean is a celebration of the beauty and mystery of our oceans, presented through the lens of a wind ensemble.

Program note from the composer – Shuying Li

J.S. Jig is a dance that fuses themes of J. S. Bach into a lilting 6/8 Irish jig. The first sketch consists of the main theme, initially as a fugue, and includes a short quote of Bach's much-loved "Jesu Joy of Man's Desiring." As the composer continued to play with the theme, experimenting with harmonies, colors and orchestration, he began to imagine old Johann himself along with some good-humored Irish musicians looking over his shoulder. He wanted them all to be pleased and like the music! To further pay homage to Bach, he decided to include the Bach chorale "Was Gott tut, das ist Wohlgetan," a chorale which the composer's father had transcribed and had become a favorite of the composer.

J.S. Jig begins with a subtle percussion groove followed by quick exchanges of the main theme between sections of instruments. A complete statement of the jig theme is followed by a short development, a fugue and a short transition into the chorale played by the brass choir as woodwinds continue the jig idea. As the main theme returns, the orchestration becomes denser, harmonies become more dissonant and the dynamics build to a thunderous climax.

Program note from the composer – Brant Karrick

University Band Program Notes

This minor-key tone poem is suggestive of the historical times surrounding the fall of Pevensey Castle in the south of England during the Dark Ages. Written in 3/4 time, this very imaginative and effective piece is perfect for contest or concert use, offering directors the opportunity to program music which contains elements not usually found at this grade level.

Program note by J.W. Pepper

Karl L. King, born in Painesville, Ohio, in 1891, was a successful conductor, composer, and baritone player. His first published composition was in 1909, titled "Moonlight on the Nile Waltz". He was only 17 at the time! When he was young, he left home to be in the Barnum and Baily Circus Band. He spent a large portion of his life there and eventually became the conductor of the ensemble. King wrote over 300 compositions in his lifetime, including the Alamo March. This piece was written to celebrate the brave heroes of the Alamo. This piece highlights King's background in the Circus with its light-hearted melodies and countermelodies. Alamo March will be sure to bring out your Texas pride.

Program note by Sara Schieferecke

Hymn to the Dawn is a ballad composed in memory of Charlie Carter, one of composer Kimberly Archer's first composition teachers. While Archer knew Carter's health was declining, she was apprehensive to face how severe his illness was. Carter died before Archer had a chance to say her goodbyes. Shifting tonalities and moving melody lines within the piece are used to represent the positive yet unresolved nature Archer had with Carter. The piece was composed to represent both the beauty in moving forward at the dawn of a new day, but also the longing for one more moment with those in our lives who have passed away.

Kimberly K. Archer (b.1973) teaches music composition, theory, orchestration, and counterpoint at Southern Illinois State University. She received her Bachelor of Music Education from Florida State University, Master of Music in Composition from Syracuse University, and Doctor of Musical Arts in Composition from the University of Texas at Austin. Dr. Archer has received a number of high-level commissions, including those from the "President's Own" United States Marine Band, Kappa Kappa Psi & Tau Beta Sigma, and multiple universities. Notably, Dr. Archer had her composition "Fanfare Polieta" premiered by the United States Marine Band at the 59th Presidential Inauguration.

Program notes by Sydney Smith

Energy Ball by Carol Brittin Chambers was commissioned in 2022 by the Driscoll Middle School Honors Band in Texas in honor of Richard Gonzales, who was retiring that spring. When current and former students were asked to recall memories and anecdotes about Mr. Gonzales, one common story was that of the Energy Ball! Sometimes, before an important performance or festival, Mr. G would say something like, "OK, everyone, clap your hands together, then pull them apart slowly and let the energy expand." Everyone would clap one more time together, and they would be ready to go. Countless students have spoken about this motivational activity from Mr. G, who made a lasting impact on his students, like so many teachers hope to do.

Cataclysm (2018)	Robert Sheldon	(b.1954)
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Robert Sheldon's *Cataclysm* is a climactic piece from the Sound Innovations series. Robert Sheldon uses intricate percussion writing and dissonate chords to create a tense atmosphere mimicking what it is like to be in the middle of a storm. A brief respite with a lyrical woodwind prominent section is reminiscent to being in the eye of a hurricane. The piece finishes with a reprise of the opening theme and a flamboyant climax to the end.

DR. ZACK DEININGER is the Assistant Director of Bands at Kansas State University. His duties include directing the Concert Band, Volleyball Band, Cat Band (basketball pep band), and Pub Crawl Band; serving as Assistant Director of the *Pride of Wildcat Land* marching band, including arranging and writing drill for the KSUMB; and instructor of undergraduate courses in conducting and the history of country music. During the summer, Dr. Deininger serves as the Assistant Coordinator of the K-State Summer Music Camp and K-State Leadership and Auxiliary Camp.

Dr. Deininger received a Doctor of Musical Arts Degree in Wind Conducting from the University of South Carolina where he served as a graduate assistant with the Carolina Bands. At the University of South Carolina, he assisted with all aspects of the concert and athletic bands, including arranging and writing drill for the University of South Carolina Marching Band, and assisted with undergraduate conducting courses. Prior to receiving his doctorate, Dr. Deininger served as the Assistant Director of Bands at Green Valley High School in Henderson, Nevada (a suburb of Las Vegas). In this position, he co-directed the 175-member Green Valley Marching and Athletic Bands, directed the Symphonic Band, Concert Band, and Jazz Band III, served as assistant conductor of the Symphonic Winds, and was instructor of the Advanced Placement Music Theory course and Chamber Class. In addition to his duties at Green Valley High School, he also served on the Nevada All State Band Committee and as Chairperson of the Southern Nevada Band Association's High School Honor Jazz Bands.

Receiving a Master's Degree in Music Education from Auburn University in Auburn, Alabama, Dr. Deininger assisted with all aspects of the Auburn Band Program serving as conductor of the Auburn University Campus Band, assistant conductor of the Auburn University Symphonic Winds, instructor of the undergraduate advanced conducting course, and assistant to all aspects of the Athletic Band Program. He holds a Bachelor's Degree in Music Education from Bowling Green State University in Bowling Green, Ohio where he studied horn under Grammy award winner Dr. Andrew Pelletier and served as Drum Major for the Falcon Marching Band for three years under Dr. Carol Hayward.

Dr. Deininger is a staff member of various summer camps throughout the country where he instructs drum majors and student leaders in leadership and conducting. He also serves as a music and marching staff member for the Macy's Great American Marching Band held over Thanksgiving each year in New York City. Dr. Deininger is a member of the College Band Directors National Association, the National Association for Music Education, the Kansas Music Educators Association, the Kansas Bandmasters Association, and the Society of Pi Kappa Lambda. He is an honorary member of Tau Beta Sigma and Kappa Kappa Psi.
