The School of Leadership Studies at Kansas State University is a value-centered learning community that provides undergraduate academic coursework through an interdisciplinary minor, and an array of programs that include student civic engagement and service-learning activities – all with the purpose of educating students for and about leadership.

Approximately 1,200 students are enrolled in the Leadership Studies minor and we reach over 2,500 students through our programs and courses.

The School provides students with academic knowledge and hands-on learning experiences that advance our mission of “Developing knowledgeable, ethical, caring, inclusive leaders for a diverse and changing world.” Students can participate in the Leadership Studies minor, which offers a standard and nonprofit focus, as well as participate in co-curricular programs that focus on personal and social responsibility. The interdisciplinary minor is designed to complement any academic major while providing a formal and structured learning experience as part of the total leadership development process. K-State Leadership Studies students represent every college in the university and bring breadth and depth to every class in the minor. Commitment to student development is first and foremost. The hallmark of the School of Leadership Studies is the focus on developing the whole person as a leader.

The discipline of Leadership Studies as it is taught at K-State is based on a broad definition of what constitutes leadership, best articulated by Joseph C. Rost (1991): *“Leadership is an influence relationship among leaders and followers who intend real changes that reflect their mutual purposes.”* Based on this definition and our mission statement, all courses and programs are designed to meet one or more of the following objectives:

- Develop **knowledge** of self, group dynamics and communication processes, and current and historical perspectives on leadership.
- Foster **ethical** decision-making through critical analysis, problem solving, and discussions about integrity and character.
- Emphasize **caring** as a key component of effective leadership which requires boldness, fortitude, service, positive change orientation, inspiration and celebration.
- Cultivate an **inclusive** world by encouraging open dialogue and sharing of stories and experiences in recognition of all that unites us.
- Appreciate **diversity** by educating about a variety of cultures, studying leadership issues of special populations, and facilitating inter-cultural communication.
- Recognize **change** as a vital part of the leadership process, and prepare future leaders to deal with change in a constructive way.

Academic Minor – 18 credit hours

All students enrolled in the minor will complete the following four core courses (9 hours):

- +LEAD 212: Introduction to Leadership Concepts (2)
- +LEAD 350: Culture and Context in Leadership (3)
- +LEAD 405: Leadership in Practice (2)
- +LEAD 450: Senior Seminar (2)

Students then have the option of selecting which track they would like to pursue in order to complete their electives (9 hours):

Standard Focus

Developed as the first model for the Leadership Studies minor, the standard focus allows students to select electives that can complement their academic major, taking one course in each of the following three categories:

- +Ethics of Leadership (3)
- +Theories of Leadership (3)
- +Foundations & Applications of Leadership (3)

Nonprofit Focus

The nonprofit focus provides students with the knowledge, skills and experience that will prepare them for leadership in today's rapidly growing nonprofit sector. Students will complete a 150-hour internship, attend a national conference, and have the opportunity to participate in the Nonprofit Leadership Student Association. At the completion of the minor, students will receive a nonprofit leadership designation on their transcript.

In addition to the four core classes, students will complete the following three designated electives.

- +LEAD 502: Ethical Dimensions of Leadership (3)

K-State's interdisciplinary minor in the School of Leadership Studies is designed to complement your academic major while providing a formal and structured learning experience as part of the total leadership development process. The minor is 18-credit hours and combines a theoretical focus with an emphasis on personal leadership development and practical experiences. The discipline of leadership studies as it is taught at K-State is based on a broad definition of what constitutes leadership, best articulated by Joseph C. Rost (1991): "Leadership is an influence relationship among leaders and followers who intend real changes that reflect their mutual purposes."

Core Courses (9 credit hours)

LEAD 212 Introduction to Leadership Concepts 2 credit hours

This course is an introduction to the Leadership Studies curriculum, focusing both on the academic study of leadership theories and the development of leadership skills. Topics will focus on the themes in the program's mission statement: knowledge, ethics, caring, and diversity.

LEAD 350 Culture and Context in Leadership 3 credit hours

This course is organized to provide students with a formal opportunity to integrate their course and leadership experiences in light of contemporary issues in the study of leadership behavior across cultures and contexts. The course is based on the current research and writing that introduce and discuss the impact of culture and context on the concept of leadership and development of individuals as interculturally competent leaders. Corequisite: sophomore standing

LEAD 405 Leadership in Practice 2 credit hours

Students will identify a leadership experience on campus or in the community that will be utilized as a practicum. Students must serve a minimum of 45 hours over the semester within the practicum. This class will utilize the adaptive leadership theory as a way to integrate theory to practice. Corequisite: junior standing

LEAD 450 Senior Seminar in Leadership Studies 2 credit hours

Students take this course during the last one or two semesters before graduation. Foundation texts of leadership studies as well as current research will be highlighted. The goal of this course is to assist students in the integration of their academic leadership course work and leadership experiences in preparation for their roles as members of the contemporary work force. Corequisite: senior standing

Standard Focus

Elective Categories (9 credit hours)

Ethics (3):

Introductory ethical concepts, social and political philosophy, ethical theories, and ethics as applied to specific professions.

Theories of Leadership and Organizational Behavior (3):

Management and organizational theories and their application in organizational and industrial settings.

Foundations and Applications of Leadership (3):

The application of leadership skills and theories to specific groups, organizations, fields of work, or academic disciplines; knowledge of various cultures; leadership communication.

You must take three hours from each of the elective categories. A full list of the electives offered can be found on the back of this page.

Nonprofit Focus

The nonprofit focus within the leadership studies minor provides students with the knowledge, skills and experience that will prepare them for leadership in today's rapidly growing nonprofit sector. At the completion of the minor, students will receive a nonprofit leadership designation on their transcript.

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Standard Focus Electives

Students minoring in Leadership Studies must receive a grade of C or higher in all courses (core and electives) counted toward the minor. In addition, students must achieve a minimum of a 2.5 GPA in the sum of their courses (core and elective). Both requirements must be met to be eligible to receive the minor.
