

Supreme Court Reconsiders Voting Rights Act: Broken Law or Broken Promise?

Law professor Reginald "Reggie" Robinson is bringing the national discussion on voting rights to Kansas State University. Using his expertise for community and civil rights leadership, Robinson will explore the recent high-profile U.S. Supreme Court Case, Shelby County v. Holder, in which the court invalidated a key provision of the U.S. Voting Rights Act. Critics claim the act was "gutted." Robinson is currently writing a scholarly article on the case.

Robinson has served in various positions for both the state and federal governments, including as a deputy associate attorney general. Robinson's work on a proposed victims' rights amendment to the U.S. Constitution led to an appointment as acting director of the Office for Victims of Crime.

Robinson will be available throughout the day to speak to classes, the media and to interested faculty.
