Introduction

Kansas State University

Kansas State University is a community of 5,600-plus faculty and staff and nearly 24,000 students from every state and more than 100 countries. K-State was founded in 1863 as the nation's first operational land-grant university, and now has campuses in Manhattan, Salina and Olathe, as well as our Global Campus, which serves thousands of distance students.

Preparing for Your Stay:

1. Pack your prescription medication and over-the-counter medication

You might not be able to buy the same medication in the USA that you use in your home country because the pharmacies do not accept foreign prescriptions and because it might not be available. Therefore, you should bring all the prescription medication you need for your stay. When travelling, you should have a valid prescription or a doctor's note written in English with the medication. The medication must be in its original packaging.

Also bring the over-the counter medication that you take regularly (for example painkillers or headache medication). Your insurance does not cover over the counter medication. https://www.fda.gov/ForConsumers/Consumer-Updates/ucm484154.htm

2. Visit your dentist

Your insurance does not cover dental care including exams, fillings, crowns, etc. Visit your dentist and have all your dental problems taken care of.

3. Visit your eye doctor and bring an extra pair of glasses

Eyes exams and glasses are not covered by your insurance. Bring even an extra pair.

What to Pack?

Manhattan and Kansas has a continental climate. The winter can be freezing cold with lots of snow or it can be relatively hot. The temperature can fluctuate substantially during the day and within the week, even in winter. The table below gives an indication what kind of clothes to pack for your stay. You will need:

- a coat
- closed shoes (or boots) that are comfortable for walking
- some warm clothes

(You can also pack small cultural items, traditional clothes or accessories in case you have a chance to showcase your country and cultural heritage.)

Arriving at the Airport

A welcome team will be waiting for you at your flight exit at the airport. They will hold a KSU sign so that you can recognize them. They will drive you to Manhattan and help you get settled in your dorm.

Welcome to Manhattan!

Manhattan is situated in the Flint Hills region of Kansas. As the name indicates, this area has rolling hills and you can find the largest uncultivated prairie of North America here. Kansas is also called the Bread Basket of the USA because it produces the largest amount of wheat. Manhattan has a population of 50,000 people. Two major institutions employ most of the people: Kansas State University (KSU) and Fort Riley. Kansas State University has about 24,000 students. Fort Riley is a large army base about 10 miles (15 kilometers away) from the city, and it gives home to about 10,000 soldiers.

Accommodation

During your program, you will stay in a residence hall. You will need to share a room with another person. The housing program is trying to assign you to rooms with other program participants. Each room is furnished with a dresser, desk and bed for each student, and provides a wireless internet connection. You have access to laundry facilities, study rooms, TV rooms, and a community kitchen. The residence halls have Student Success Centers, where the students have free tutoring, and use free computer stations. Smoking is forbidden in the residence halls, and it is allowed only in designated areas outdoors. It is violation of law to use any illegal drugs.

It is a recommended that you discuss basic courtesy rules with your roommate when you move in to help you both accommodate to the new living arrangements and to avoid future conflicts. In the USA, quite hours are usually between 10:00 pm and 6:00 am.

Meals:

During your program, you will have all your meals in the dining center closest to your residence hall. The dining centers do not offer Sunday evening dinners. Therefore, the program will either offer you activities with food or provide you with funds for meals.

Transportation

ATA (Flint Hills Area Transportation Services) provides transportation services on campus and in the city.

- 1. The ATA Shuttle connects the dining center and Jardine apartments through a loop that operates from 6:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 8 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. on Sundays. You can catch the shuttle at any of these stops, in this order:
 - Jardine's Tunstall Circle between the Frith Community Center and Cornerstone Coffee & Bakery
 - In front of Marlatt Hall

2. Park 'n' Ride ATA Bus Route

4. ATA Shuttles in Manhattan

During your stay, you will have a pass to use all ATA shuttle fixed routes. Each route has a color signal. The buses stop at the designated bus stops and run according to a fixed schedule. 5. During your free weekends, you need to arrange your own transportation.

The university is not responsible for arranging a trip for you. However, we are happy to give suggestions about destinations.

Important Traffic Rules in Manhattan:

- Always buckle your seatbelt when you travel by car even if you are a passenger.
- Texting and talking on the phone is forbidden while driving.
- Driving under the influence of alcohol is forbidden.

Health Insurance and Health Care Services in Manhattan

The American health care system is complicated. However, you do not need to worry as you have health insurance and have access to the university's health care center, Lafene.

You have CISI Health insurance provided by the IIE. This insurance is accepted by many physicians in the area and by the emergency clinics. Also, as you are an international student at K-State, you are automatically enrolled for health insurance coverage with United Healthcare Student Resources (UHCSR). After you have enrolled in classes, you can create an account at the health insurance company's website www.uhcsr.com and print off a card to carry http://www.k-state.edu/isss/students/health_insurance/Plan%20Details.html

Even if you have health insurance, you need to pay copayments, deductibles, and out-of-the expenses. As mentioned above, your insurance might not cover:

• Dental care

Vision care

• Over-the-counter mediation

Required Vaccines:

You have been asked already to complete the vaccination record and the TB written screen form required by Lafene Health Center. In case you are at risk and Lafene requires you to be tested, you will have time for the test after your arrival and the test is paid for by your insurance. With your e-ID and password, you can upload your immunization record from your computer on myLafene+ account: https://www.kstate.edu/lafene/vaccinationrequirement.html
Please also bring the paper form of your immunization records in case it is needed.

What to do when you get sick?

1. If you catch cold, you can simple buy some over the counter medication. All major stores (Wal-Mart, target, Dillons, Hi-Vee) have pharmacies. Over-the counter medications are NOT covered by insurance.

2. Lafene Health Center:

If you get sick during the week, and you need to see a doctor, visit Lafene Health Center. You will need your K-State student ID for an appointment. While you can simply show up, you can make an appointment on phone or online to save time. The center is open during the week and on Saturday morning. 3. Urgent Care Clinics

If you need to see a doctor in the evening or during the weekend, you can choose to visit an urgent care facility. These facilities are cheaper than hospital emergency care. They are open till 7:00 pm daily except on Sundays (till 6:00 pm)

Mobile Phones

If your cell phone operates using a *subscriber identity module*, or "SIM" card and if it can be operated on AT&T and T-Mobile frequency, you need to purchase a US SIM card and SIM service from AT&T or T-Mobile that you can use in the USA. If your mobile telephone does not work in Kansas, you will need to purchase a month of pre-paid telephone service and a mobile telephone that will work in Kansas.

Wi-Fi access will be available in nearly all campus buildings, so it may still **be possible to send** and receive messages on your mobile device when it is connected to the Internet without purchasing any additional services.

Academic Program

You are going to attend three different courses as part of your program. The courses were designed to meet the program requirements. PDPI and IIE requires us, the English language Program to provide you with 180 hours of coursework. Therefore, you must attend the classes, work on assignments, and participate in school visits and workshops to receive the program certificate. If you are ill or have had an accident, contact Wendy Matthews and notify your teachers.

U.S. History and Culture through Film Course

With all the PDPI participants, you will watch films set in different periods of U.S. history and related to different aspects of U.S. culture that shape present day politics and education. This is an integrated skills course, so you will study new vocabulary and read about historical periods and cultural topics that support the viewing experience and help you learn content. You will be encouraged to reflect how the historical and cultural content could be integrated into your own English courses. As part of this course, you will visit the State Capitol and the Kansas History Museum in Topeka. You will also visit the Brown v. Board of Education national historical site in Topeka, Kansas. Participants will explore the history of the legal case which ended statesanctioned racial segregation in public schools across the U.S.

Oral Communication Skills - Intermediate I or Intermediate II

You will improve your pronunciation, listening, and communication skills by listening to and discussing various U.S. history and culture related topics. Oral fluency and presentation skills necessary for classroom situations will be emphasized.

Teaching Methodologies and Practices - Intermediate I or Intermediate II

The course includes a review of methodologies with an eye to applications in the classroom, discussions about best teaching practices, and discussions with ELP faculty. This course will focus primarily on the teaching of listening, speaking, and pronunciation with additional units on vocabulary development and oral grammar as time allows. As part of the course, you will attend a workshop organized by the Teaching and Learning Center of K-State, and you will visit several local schools.

Lab Hours/Tutoring

You will have the opportunity to use our language learning software programs and resource materials, prepare your assignments, watch movies as preparation for the culture class, or receive individualized tutoring.
