Kansas State University

Preparing for Your Stay:

1. **Pack your prescription medication and over-the-counter medication** You might not be able to buy the same medication in the USA that you use in your home country because the pharmacies do not accept foreign prescriptions and because it might not be available. Therefore, you should bring all the prescription medication you need for your stay. When travelling, you should have a valid prescription or a doctor's note written in English with the medication. The medication must be in its original packaging.

Also bring the over-the counter medication that you take regularly (for example painkillers or headache medication). Your insurance does not cover over the counter medication.

2. Visit your dentist

Your insurance does not cover dental care including exams, fillings, crowns, etc. Visit your dentist and have all your dental problems taken care of.

3. Visit your eye doctor and bring an extra pair of glasses Eyes exams and glasses are not covered by your insurance. Bring even an extra pair.

What Clothes to Pack?

Manhattan and Kansas has a continental climate. October and November are usually the fall months when morning are chilly, but the afternoons are pleasant. People usually wear long pants, and several layer of tops so that they could take off a layer if the afternoon gets hotter. Winter usually starts in December, and it can be freezing cold with lots of snow or it can be relatively hot. The temperature can fluctuate substantially during the day and within the week, even in winter. The table below gives an indication what kind of clothes to pack for your stay. You will need:

- several layers of clothing (undershirt, tops of varying thickness)
- closed shoes (or boots) that are comfortable for walking
- some warm clothes (a couple of pullovers or cardigans)
- a coat if you have one

Important: Prior departure, check your airlines' weight and size baggage restrictions!

Very important:

After your arrival, you will have the opportunity to go shopping for school supplies and personal hygiene items. (You will receive your course books from the ELP, but you need to have your own stationary /pens, pencils, and notebook.)

When the weather turns colder, you will also have to chance to purchase warmer clothes in case you are not able to bring warm clothes with you

Arriving at the Airport

A welcome team will be waiting for you at your flight exit at the airport. They will hold a sign so that you can recognize them. They will drive you to Manhattan and help you get settled in your dorm. If you do not see someone right after your arrival, do not panic! Your welcome team might get delayed, but they will be coming shortly.

Important: If there is a last minute change that affects your arrival time, or if one of your flights gets delayed, or if you miss your flight, send a message to Wendy Matthews right away with the new arrival information so that she can arrange transportation for you.

Welcome to Manhattan!

Manhattan is situated in the Flint Hills region of Kansas. As the name indicates, this area has rolling hills and you can find the largest uncultivated prairie of North America here. Kansas is also called the Bread Basket of the USA because it produces the largest amount of wheat. Manhattan has a population of 50,000 people. Two major institutions employ most of the people: Kansas State University (KSU) and Fort Riley. Kansas State University has about 24,000 students. Fort Riley is a large army base about 10 miles (15 kilometers away) from the city, and it gives home to about 10,000 soldiers.

Accommodation

During your program, you will stay in Jardine Apartments Building L. The apartments have a couple of bedrooms and have a little different floorplans. You will share apartments with group members of the same gender and have your own separate bedroom You will receive information about your assigned room in a separate email.

Each apartment contains a window air conditioner and central heating. Free wireless internet is included, and units are also wired for internet and cable in the living room. Your apartment will not have a washing machine. However, the Jardine Apartments Complex has several laundry rooms that are open 24 hours a day. There is a small charge to use the washing machines and the dryers. Moreover, there is a small refrigerator and microwave oven in each apartment, but the apartments are not equipped with cooking appliances. (Your program provides you with three meals a day [see below for details]) Your building is just a few blocks from the International

Technology Commons (ITC) where most of your workshops will be held. It is also very close to the Recreation Center, where you can exercise.

It is recommended that you discuss basic courtesy rules with your roommate when you move in to help you both accommodate to the new living arrangements and to avoid future conflicts. In the USA, quiet hours are usually between 10:00 pm and 6:00 am.

Hygiene Tips

- Generally, Americans shower every day.
- Americans consider body odor unpleasant, so they use deodorant.
- Toilet paper should be flushed down the toilets. However, other items should be discarded in waste bins.
- Toilets and the sink area of bathrooms are dry. If you splash water in these areas, it is polite to wipe the splashed water before you leave. Bidets are not commonly used in the USA.

Meals

During your program, you will have your meals in the dining center closest to your residence hall, Kramer Dining Center. You can walk there or you can take a shuttle bus. The dining center offers a wide variety of meals including vegetarian dishes. However, halal meals are not directly offered.

Also, the dining centers do not offer Sunday evening dinners, and they will be closed during the Thanksgiving break. You will receive a card with \$8 for each Sunday meal, and \$20 for each day when the dining centers are closed. The program will also several activities where food will be offered.

Transportation

ATA (Flint Hills Area Transportation Services) provides transportation services on campus and in the city.

- 1. The ATA Shuttle connects the dining center and Jardine apartments through a loop that operates from 6:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 8 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. on Sundays. You can catch the shuttle at any of these stops, in this order:
 - Jardine's Tunstall Circle between the Frith Community Center and Cornerstone Coffee & Bakery

- 2. Park 'n' Ride ATA Bus Route

3. ATA Shuttles in Manhattan

During your stay, you will be able to use all ATA shuttle fixed routes with the help of your K-State ID. There are more routes offered during the week than on Saturday, and there is no ride on Sunday. Each route has a color signal. The buses stop at the designated bus stops and run according to a fixed schedule. There are no shuttle rides on Sunday. 4. Travelling with K-State Minivans

During your stay, ELP staff members will drive you in a KSU minivan to scheduled cultural activities and fieldtrips. All the drivers have special van certification.

Important Traffic Rules in Manhattan:

- Always buckle your seatbelt when you travel by car even if you are a passenger.
- Texting and talking on the phone is forbidden while driving.
- Driving under the influence of alcohol is forbidden.

Health Insurance and Health Care Services in Manhattan

The American health care system is complicated. However, you do not need to worry as you have health insurance and have access to the university's health care center, Lafene. Once you arrive, you can create an account at the health insurance company's website www.uhcsr.com and print off a card to carry http://www.k-state.edu/isss/students/health_insurance/Plan%20Details.html

Even when you have health insurance, you need to pay copayments, deductibles, and out-ofpocket expenses. As mentioned above, your insurance might not cover: **Dental care, Vision care, and over-the-counter medication**

Required Vaccines:

Please bring the paper form of your immunization records in case it is needed.

What to do when you get sick?

1. If you catch cold, you can simple buy some over the counter medication. All major stores (Wal-Mart, target, Dillons, Hi-Vee) have pharmacies. Over-the counter medications are NOT covered by insurance.

2. Lafene Health Center:

If you get sick during the week, and you need to see a doctor, visit Lafene Health Center. You will need your K-State student ID for an appointment. While you can simply show up, you can make an

3. Urgent Care Clinics

If you need to see a doctor in the evening or during the weekend, you can choose to visit an urgent care facility. These facilities are cheaper than hospital emergency care. They are open till 7:00 pm daily except on Sundays (till 6:00 pm)

Mobile Phones

Wi-Fi access will be available in nearly all campus buildings, so it may still be possible to send and receive messages on your mobile device when it is connected to the Internet without purchasing any additional services. Previous program participants used either WhatsApp or Facebook Messenger with success. There are also many other apps (Snapchat, Telegram) that you might try. However, when you are not on campus, your cellphone will not work without *the appropriate SIM* service.

If you are like most visitors from Indonesia, you will probably arrive on campus at K-State carrying a cellphone that uses global systems for mobile communication, also called "GSM." This means that your cellphone operates using a SIM card, or "kartu SIM." There are five major cellphone carriers in our part of North America: Verizon, Sprint, T-Mobile, U.S. Cellular, and AT&T. Of these, only two, T-Mobile and AT&T, offer GSM service using *kartu SIM*.

You will find two possible situations:

Situation 1: Your cellphone does not work in Kansas.

If your cellphone only operates on 900 and 1800 megahertz, then it likely will not work in Kansas.

Typically, this happens with the most popular and expensive smartphones. In this situation, you will be able to purchase a month of pre-paid telephone service and a cellphone that will work in Kansas for about \$90

Situation 2: Your cellphone works in Kansas.

Samsung, Nokia, and other common brands will sometimes work in Kansas, even if purchased in Asia. If your cellphone can be operated on AT&T's frequency or T-Mobile's frequency, you will be able to use it here and purchase only the service at a cost of around \$60.

Thanksgiving Break and Thanksgiving Holiday Season

The regular university students as well as some of the ELP instructors will have a week-long break from November 19 to 22. However, as requested your sponsoring agency, DIKTI you are going to have workshops on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday November 19-21. Thursday, November 22 is Thanksgiving Day, one of the greatest holiday in the USA. You will have the opportunity to participate in a traditional Thanksgiving dinner. The following day is Black Friday, the largest shopping day in the USA. Some transportation for shopping will be provided on this date and over the weekend. Other weekend activities may be arranged if there is interest.

As a holiday, Thanksgiving is uniquely American. Although it began as a religious holiday for Protestants in the New England region of the U.S., American people from every religious, ethnic, regional, and cultural background now celebrate this important holiday every year. Quite similar to the Lebaran holidays in Indonesia, there is a strong emphasis on family life at Thanksgiving, and all Americans who are able to do so feel an obligation to travel to their home regions for family visits and other activities

Your program allows you to travel within the U.S. from the morning of Thanksgiving Day, November 22 until the evening of Sunday, November 25, when you must return to campus. However, please know that air, train, and bus ticket prices during the Thanksgiving holiday are likely to be several times higher than at other times of the year. For this reason, any travel that you and your colleagues wish to arrange within the U.S. during the four-day period of November 22-25 must be pre-arranged as quickly as possible, before the very expensive holiday ticket prices come into effect.

Academic Program

The program consists of three courses as well as several workshop series. Class attendance, completion of assignments, workshop participation are required in order to receive the program certificate. If an accident or illness prevents you from full participation at any point in the program, contact Wendy Matthews and notify your teachers.

Advanced Integrated Skills Course

This course provides participants with the support needed to be successful in academic communication at the graduate level. Participants will read articles related to their fields. They will practice summarizing and following appropriate conventions for citation. Participants will polish their communication skills by participating in small group discussions and group work and practicing academic presentations.

Advanced Writing Course

This course addresses academic writing skills in order to improve the writing of various academic texts, such as analyses, summaries, reports, proposals, and research papers. Focus areas include grammar review, the study of style, development of academic vocabulary, and conventions of academic writing including incorporating sources and citations. The common goal is a higher level of performance and understanding of academic writing. Techniques of effective written expression are developed through writing, evaluation, and revision. In addition to the textbooks, an online library research module developed by University library staff for use by international participants will be used to provide background information and hands-on practice using available research resources and navigating academic library systems.

Academic Preparation Course

The course serves as an introduction to the U.S. higher education system and U.S. culture and will feature lectures and activities in class, as well as workshops outside of class with guest lecturers from the campus community.
