K-State Carnegie Foundation Community Engagement Reclassification

The Carnegie Foundation Community Engagement Classification is a national recognition granted to higher education institutions that demonstrates an institutional commitment to community engagement. It defines community engagement as the collaboration between institutions of higher education and their larger communities.

Kansas State University, as the nation's first operational land-grant university, has received this community engagement classification since 2010. We applied for K-State's second reclassification in 2025.

This reclassification supports K-State's mission to integrate engagement across teaching, research, and service. It enhances the university's visibility, demonstrates strategic alignment with the Next-Gen

K-State plan and strengthens its position as a leader in public service and outreach while addressing social challenges through engaged teaching, research, and outreach.

This milestone aligns directly with K-State's identity as Kansas's land-grant institution, where community engagement is central to our mission. It affirms our long-standing dedication to serving the public good through collaboration with partners at the local, regional, state, national, and global levels. As the next-generation land-grant university, K-State is integrating engagement across all we do.

Carnegie Foundation Definition of Community Engagement

The Carnegie Foundation defines **community engagement** as the collaboration between institutions of higher education and their larger communities, whether local, regional, national, or global, for the mutually beneficial exchange of knowledge and resources in a context of partnership and reciprocity.

This approach emphasizes shared goals and mutual respect, recognizing that both academic institutions and community partners contribute valuable perspectives and expertise. The purpose of such engagement is to integrate university resources—such as scholarship, research, teaching, and service—with community-identified needs and opportunities. In doing so, community engagement enriches learning, fosters civic responsibility, advances democratic values, addresses critical societal issues, and contributes to the public good.

Why This Classification Matters

The Carnegie Foundation Community Engagement Classification affirms K-State's excellence in community engagement and serves as a catalyst for ongoing improvement. Specifically, the classification provides:

- **National recognition** from the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching
- **Validates K-State's public service mission** and commitment to civic engagement
- **Enhances institutional credibility** and opens new opportunities for funding, partnerships, and policy influence
- **Demonstrates leadership** in community-based education, research, and outreach

K-State's Commitment to Engagement

Kansas State University focuses its engagement on creating a more responsive, meaningful, and impactful approach to serving Kansans and addressing society's most pressing challenges. By fully integrating engagement, outreach, and extension into the university's land-grant mission alongside teaching and research, the university amplifies its role as a catalyst for public good. Kansas State University is transforming to become the next-generation land-grant university. Launched in July 2022, this ambitious initiative responds to the evolving needs of our communities, state and world, requiring bold vision and transformative change.

K-State's mission emphasizes excellence in student experience, research, discovery, extension and engagement activities. We are expanding our definition of "student body" to encompass all 2.9 million Kansans, enabling us to better serve our state's diverse needs.
