• Coming 2004-05 academic year: In the Fall of 2004, our visiting creative writers will be Antonya Nelson, fiction writer; and David Mason, poet. And in the Spring of 2005, we will have visits from Carloes Eire, historian and memoirist

Carlos Eire's Waiting for Snow in Havana: Confessions of a Cuban Boy is this year's winner of the National Book Award for Non-Fiction. This memoir tells of Eire's childhood in 1950s Havana, where he was the son of a prominent judge, and the later troubles he and his family faced after the Cuban Revolution. The New Yorker describes Eire's writing as "so urgent and so vividly personal...that his unsparing indictments of practically everyone concerned, including himself, seem all the more remarkable." Eire is the T. Lawrason Riggs Professor of History and Religious Studies at Yale University. He has authored four other books: he describes Waiting for Snow in Havana as his "first book without footnotes."

Antonya Nelson is the author of four short story collections (the most recent is titled Female Trouble) and three novels (Talking in Bed, Nobody's Girl and Living to Tell). Her work has appeared in many magazines including *The* New Yorker, Harper's, and Esquire, as well as in anthologies such as The O. Henry Awards and Best American Short Stories. She teaches creative writing at the University of Houston and New Mexico State University. Nelson is a native Kansan, and an alumna of KU.

David Mason is one of the American poets who might be identified with a poetry that used

to be called "The New Narrative," a mode identified with "Story Line Press." Previous collections of his have won won prizes, such as the Alice fay di Castagnola Prize and the Nicholas Roerich Poetry Prize. He is the editor, with Dana Gioia and Meg Schoerke of *Twentieth Century* American Poetry and Twentieth Century American Poetics (McGraw Hill, 2004). His most recent collection, Arrivals, was just published by Story Line Press. He teaches at The Colorado College.
