1. Teresa Hartman called the meeting to order at 3:31 pm.

2. The November 1, 2016 minutes were approved as submitted.

- 3. Solar Eclipse (August 21, 2017) Guests: Andrew Bennett and Chris Sorensen Hartman welcome our guests FS President Andy Bennett and Chris Sorensen, department of physics. Sorensen informed committee members of the total eclipse that will occur this year. It will take place in our area around 1 pm on Monday, August 21, 2017, which is the first day of fall classes. Many faculty, staff, and students will likely want to see this phenomenon. For our area, the total eclipse can be viewed best near Beatrice, Nebraska. Sorensen would like to determine what support there is for perhaps canceling class that day. FS President Bennett indicated the provost has not closed her mind to this; however, there would need to be full support. If classes are not canceled there should be some way to forgive that day for those who do want to travel to see the eclipse at its best. If nothing is done and students do not come to class the first day, there is the possibility they could be dropped from a class. There isn't an obvious right choice, therefore, input is being requested. If there is a request to change the academic calendar, that request would need to be approved by the Chair of Board of Regents. Nielsen reported that the board of regents require a total of 146 class days and currently there are 148 class days. Therefore, if the date of classes starting was moved to the 22nd, there would still be enough class days; however, the change in the schedule would still require BOR approval and would also set off a chain reaction for many other internal processes to be manipulated to fit. It can be done, but would require effort. This will likely set a precedent so it is good to consider the options carefully. Lengthy discussion continued. The majority of committee members were in favor of canceling class that day or moving the start of the semester, however, it was recognized there are possible issues that would need sorted out. Some members commented that it may be too complicated to cancel classes. For example, the College of Veterinary Medicine has veterinary students who will need to remain to care for animals. It was also noted that on occasion inclement weather occurs and classes are canceled and that may have a bearing on class days. Members discussed the possibility of the provost charging a steering committee to address the issues. Another option would be to draft a resolution for the provost to take action. After further discussion a motion was made by Reinert for this committee to craft a resolution to have the provost ask that BOR approve to move the start date of the fall 2017 semester. Charney seconded the motion. Discussion continued. If dates are changed now, that would be better than changing them later on. Motion carried 6 in favor, 3 opposed. President Bennett offered to help assist with the resolution as well as Reinert. Hartman encouraged committee members to with their constituents about this. The resolution will hopefully be ready in time for a vote at the Faculty Senate meeting in December.

Motion carried. Hartman thanked Schroeder for his attendance and response to questions.

Hartman thanked Don Gruenbacher, Steve Warren, and Punit Prakash for attending to answer questions regarding this new degree proposal. Gruenbacher provided an overview of the program. A total of 133 credit hours will be required for a student to graduate. This is the most

requested degree that is not offered currently. Various questions and comments were addressed including location of the degree within the college, impact on other departments, and resource implications. It is anticipated that a good portion of the students will be new, however, there also could be some students that transfer internally from another engineering program. In addition, the gender diversification would be a benefit to K-State. Motion carried. Hartman thanked all of the visitors for their attendance and information regarding the program.

5. Old Business (4:41)

- A. Secondary Majors allow K-State Graduate Students to complete undergraduate secondary majors. Hartman reported that this item will be tabled for the time being due to a couple of factors. First, the graduate council would like the opportunity to review this proposed change and second, CAPP has been discussing the potential of allowing K-State graduates and non-K-State graduates to take secondary majors, much like what was approved for minors in 2010. This creates many more questions and would need further scrutiny. It is apparent FS Academic Affairs and CAPP have been discussing different paths regarding secondary majors. Academic Affairs had agreed only to allow degree-seeking K-State graduate students to enroll. Therefore, this will be discussed further prior to any action moving it forward. Hartman will keep members informed of what she hears from both Graduate Council and CAPP.
- B. University Honors Program proposals approval process
 Hartman reminded committee members the discussion about a process for University Honors
 Program changes, such as a change to course prefixes, new courses, or any curriculum changes that
 would be proposed. A small group needs to be formed to move this forward. Reinert as well as
 Bormann volunteered. It was suggested that members from UHP be part of this work group since
 they are vested in the outcome. There was consensus. Therefore, Hartman, Bormann, and Reinert
 will work with Jim Hohenbary and possibly another person from UHP on this process.
- C. CIP Code change request form

As agreed at the last meeting, approval of CIP code change requests shall be more of an administrative process. A form was crafted and Hartman distributed it for the committee's input and vote. It was reviewed and edited by Planning and Analysis, the provost office, and the graduate school. All voted in favor of this form being used. The approved form will be shared with Faculty Senate as an informational item. This form will be used until such a time as Curriculog can be used for the process. Hartman will collaborate with the appropriate persons to determine how best to disseminate the information.

6. Committee reports:

- A. Committee on Academic Policy and Procedures Reinert Reinert reported the committee continued discussion of definitions for course component codes, they are still in the information gathering phase. They reviewed printing of certificates and how that occurs. Secondary majors were also discussed.
- B. KSIS Reinert Working through various projects. Again, KSIS will receive an upgrade in the upcoming future.
- C. University Library Committee Bormann

Bormann reported on the first Library committee meeting this semester. Due to budget cuts they are making cuts to journal subscriptions, library hours are being reduced, and positions are not being filled. Chumachenko commented these changes are affecting faculty and students all across campus.

- D. Curriculog Implementation Committee update/feedback Hartman Hartman deferred to Charlotte Pfaff for an update. Pfaff was in attendance today as an observer for the meeting and was happy to provide an update on the project. The committee has been working hard. She reported that just this morning the committee discussed a possible go-live date of February 1, 2017 in Curriculog for the pilot colleges. This would be just for the course proposals. If the pilot colleges have a smooth transition, it could be possible that the other colleges could go live with their course proposals in March. They continue to work with the vendor and have identified desired changes that the vendor includes on their list of possible feature improvements for the future. Pfaff commented that the purpose in making changes to the course and curriculum approval process is not only to make it an automated process, but to endeavor to make it better and easier for the user. The go live date will affect the Faculty Senate Academic affairs committee in that they will be getting proposals from two different methods during the transition. Hartman thanked her for the report and for visiting the committee today.
- 7. Announcements/for the good of the University
 The 14th president of Kansas State University was announced today: General Richard Myers.

Charney attended a portion of the FAC meeting as a liaison for the Teval discussion. He mentioned that group continues to move along. He also was able to share with FAC the conversation that took place in AAC today regarding the Solar Eclipse.
