1. President Brian Lindshield called the meeting to order at 3:30 pm.

2. The October 31, 2017 Executive Committee minutes were approved as submitted.

- 3. Report from Standing Committees and Student Senate
 - A. Academic Affairs Jenny Bormann/Teresa Hartman
 - Proposed items for consent agenda (page 4-6)

A motion was made to place the items from the consent agenda on the Faculty Senate agenda. Questions were asked regarding the use of two K-State 8 tags on proposed courses and the lack of impact statements when other units could be affected. The chairs of Academic Affairs will follow-up with these departments to investigate this further.

Questions were raised about the Agricultural Communications and Journalism curriculum changes regarding the reduction of humanities and social science requirements and removing specific courses without an impact statement. Senator Bormann indicated that this reduction was made to reduce their curriculum to 120 hours per the Board of Regents requirements.

The consensus was that the two Agricultural Communications and Journalism (Agricultural and Environmental options) curriculum changes will be moved to the discussion agenda for Faculty Senate.

The consent agenda (minus this major) will be placed on the Faculty Senate agenda.

Proposed item for discussion agenda (page 7)

A motion was made to place the new Bachelor of Science in Educational Studies degree proposal on the discussion agenda for Faculty Senate.

Questions were raised regarding the area of emphasis where it discusses requiring 36 hours (14 from College of Education and 24 from other sources). This must be a typo as this does not add up to 36 hours. It also indicates that the additional 24 hours will be selected in consultation with an advisor. It is unclear, however, who will determine whether or not the courses are acceptable. Given that this is a large block of courses for this program, there is discomfort with approving this program without understanding who will approve those courses. The Academic Affairs chairs will follow up with the department regarding these issues.

The discussion agenda will be placed on the Faculty Senate agenda.

Academic Affairs reviewed the suggested changes from Faculty Senate to the incomplete policy (University Handbook, Section F83). They also received a proposal from CAPP for revisions to Section F65.1 related to the retake policy. Both of these proposals have been sent back to CAPP, and either Senator Bormann or Hartman will attend the next CAPP meeting. Senator Spears

recommended that they suggest when a faculty member files an incomplete, they also provide the grade the student will receive if the incomplete is not completed.

B. Faculty Affairs – David Lehman

Senators Barden and Lehman met with Ruth Dyer and Robert Large to discuss Section E of the University Handbook on Sabbatical Leave. They discussed the possibility of calling it "Sabbatical Assignment" rather than "Sabbatical Leave" and this was not supported by Dyer or Large. President Lindshield recommended that they use wording similar to what is used in the KBOR handbook, that of "sabbatical" rather than sabbatical leave.

They also discussed issues relating to what funds are available to use for faculty travel when on Sabbatical. Robert Large will look into the terminology relating to "state funds" and will look into options to clarify the travel language to include this appropriate language. Robert Large will recommend revisions to Section E based on that discussion and will send it back to Faculty Affairs for review.

Faculty Affairs also continued discussing conflict resolution issues. Charlotte Self reported that HCS Employee Relations looked at their website and are working to make it easier for individuals to find the relevant resources. Charlotte will also meet with Christy Craft regarding the Ombudspersons' needs regarding training and will use this information to move forward with developing training for the Ombudspersons. Charlotte is planning to bring together the different offices that are involved in dispute resolution (i.e., HCS, mediation services, ombudspersons, Office of Institutional Equity, etc.) to come up with a standardized way of reporting their cases and other issues they have in common.

C. Professional Staff Affairs – Loleta Sump

In their last meeting, Professional Staff Affairs discussed the possibility of conducting another survey of their constituents late next year. PSA will be establishing an unclassified professional listserv to promote communication across campus. They also continued discussion of recognizing unclassified professionals, potentially through a longevity plan. They plan to continue to invite Jay Stephens, VP of Human Capital Services, to their meetings occasionally to get updates on the Total Rewards process. They are also looking into obtaining spouse/dependent tuition grants for term employees.

D. Student Senate -Olivia Baalman

Thursday is the last SGA meeting for this semester. The Educational Opportunity Fund Committee is concluding their work this week, so organizations will be notified soon regarding funding they receive. All SGA members will be required to participate in bystander intervention training on November 30. Finally, SGA is working with the registrar's office to look at the DARS interface.

E. Technology - Michael Raine

FSCOT continues to meet with Gary Pratt, Chief Information Officer, regarding shared governance plans. They will keep senators informed about these conversations.

F. University Planning – Laurel Littrell

FSCOUP participated in the open house for the traffic study that was held on November 15th. Ethan Erickson will notify Senator Littrell when the results of the traffic study will be available online. The traffic study consisted of vehicle and pedestrian traffic at the crosswalks around campus and the cost of different options. At this point, recommendations have not been provided.

FSCOUP is also looking at the Campus Creek drainage improvement. The City has received partial funding for this project, but not full funding.

The wording for the City/University Funds proposal will need to be somewhat vague given that their deadline is Friday and they do not have complete information on either of these projects that are to be included.

Lastly, the University Library Committee will meet on November 29th to discuss the library resolution that was brought forward to Faculty Senate last spring. FSCOUP will continue this discussion at their December 7th meeting.

4. New Business

A. Honorary Degree Candidate

A motion was made by Past President Bennett and seconded by President Elect Wood to approve placement of this item on the December Faculty Senate meeting agenda. The motion was approved.

B. Weapons Policy Optional Syllabus language update

President Elect Wood indicated that the working group has nearly completed a new weapons policy optional syllabus statement, increasing clarity and using language directly from the weapons policy. This optional language will be finalized and will be presented at the December Faculty Senate meeting. It was clarified that the Provost has the ultimate determination regarding the syllabus statements that are required and optional.

A motion was made by Senator Spears and seconded by Senator Littrell to add the working group's suggested weapons policy optional syllabus language to the Faculty Senate agenda. Faculty Senate will have the opportunity to endorse the syllabus language. Motion approved.

5. Announcements

 Provost Mason will join us for the December Faculty Senate meeting. Members requested that she
 speak on the budget, enrollment management, and the effects/achievements of KSUnite and any
 planned follow-up activities.
