- 1. President Littrell called the meeting to order and played the Land Acknowledgment
- 2. President Littrell requested to take the agenda out of order, to allow our guest, Kimathi Choma, to briefly present here regarding his role as student ombudsperson. Choma first shared that he has two distinct roles here at K-State, and these are entirely separate from each other. He is the assistant dean for diversity, recruitment, and retention in the college of Arts and Sciences. He is also the Student Ombudsperson, which position he serves in a different office on campus. The latter position is the inaugural appointment for a three-year term. Our students advocated for us to have a student ombudsperson and he is honored to serve in this role. He shared a brief video and several websites containing information regarding an ombudsperson's role and also more specific to his role as Student Ombudsperson. They are as follows:

There are three ombudspersons at K-State that are available for faculty and staff. At this time, he is the only student ombudsperson but at some point, there may be a need to have a full time, independent position dedicated to this role. He saw about 10 students in the fall and anticipates the same or more in the spring. It was clarified that he is not a direct report related to Title IX cases, in this role, nor is he required to directly report to Office of Institutional Equity. Ombudspersons are not mandatory reporters. He is there to provide resources. Additionally, he is neutral. He emphasized that his position is the "Informal" process as he promotes being a trusted resource for undergraduate and graduate students. He shared a flyer and link with more information and the location of this office in 101J Holton Hall. Members thanked him for his presentation and we will see Dr. Choma at the FS meeting in a couple of weeks.

3. Term Appointment Caucus election results – Introduction of Jennifer Miller
President Littrell reminded senators of our new Term Appointment caucus, which information was shared
out to K-State Today and our senators as well. She welcomed Jennifer Miller to the Executive Committee.

She will be serving as the first caucus chair. We're so excited to have this new caucus in place and look forward to collaborating with these dedicated senators.

- 4. President Littrell inquired if there were any changes or corrections to the November 30th Executive Committee minutes. Seeing none, these were approved as submitted.
- 5. Report from Standing Committees, Graduate Student Council, and Senates
 - A. Academic Affairs Jenny Bormann/Don Von Bergen
 - Proposed consent agenda items (pages 5-8)
 Senator Von Bergen made a motion to place the consent agenda items on the upcoming Faculty
 Senate agenda. A brief comment was shared related to the News and Sports Media B.A./B.S. change.
 The proposal will be conditional based upon approval of a new degree, which was approved by FS in
 December and is at the Board's step currently (Advertising and Public Relations BA/BS). Because the
 current request removes two of the curriculum tracks and changes the degree title to the Journalism
 and Mass Communications degree, they want to be sure the Board first approves the new degree,
 that encompasses those two tracks, so that these changes will complement each other. If for some
 reason the board does not approve the new degree, the News and Sports Media B.A./B.S. changes
 will not go in effect and will be returned to the college. It's not anticipated the board will reject the
 new degree, this is just being done in order to be proactive. Motion passed.
 - Proposed discussion agenda items (page 9)
 Senator Von Bergen made a motion to place the several discussion agenda items on the upcoming Faculty Senate agenda. Motion passed.

The committee is just beginning their spring meetings and will continue to work on the 21-22 docket.

- B. Faculty Affairs Marcellus Caldas/Veronica Denison
 Senator Denison gave a University Handbook update regarding Appendix R and mentioned that they are not going to charge the committee until it is decided who will serve.
- C. Graduate Student Council Pingping Chen or David Marcus
 Senator Chen mentioned their first general meeting will be on zoom. Other events will be scheduled online due to increased COVID positive numbers. They have planned professional and skills development workshops along with a financial workshop. For information, details and dates please check out their website.
- D. Professional Staff Affairs Renee Gates/Mishelle Hay McCammant
 Senator Hay McCammant mentioned the continuing work on the university-wide staff recognition and
 continued advocacy for staffs in offices for COVID compliance. President Littrell suggested that our
 ombudspersons are great resources for COVID compliance issues and concerns
- E. Student Senate Blake PhillipsWas unable to attend and had no report except to share they are gearing up for spring activity.
- F. Technology Brett DePaola/Michael Raine They have not met but plan to Feb. 1.
- G. University Planning Martin Seay No report; they will meet next week.

H. University Support Staff Senate – Mary Oborny or Monica Macfarlane Senator Oborny mentioned they will meet next month as the past meeting was cancelled due to the number of flu and COVID cases. 6. Announcements

- A. Faculty Senate 2022 Elections
 - President Littrell shared that the elections process is beginning. Candace will be sending a memo along with election files to caucus chairs soon. Because the inaugural Term Appointment caucus elections just concluded, they will not have an election this year or the next.
- B. KBOR meeting report: https://www.k-state.edu/today/announcement/?id=79812
 They met Jan. 19, 2022. KBOR voted to extend the tenure clock extension policy for faculty hired during the 2020 academic year and into the next academic year as the COVID disruptions have continued to occur for research, instruction and other faculty activities. All regent universities were in support of this policy. There was discussion on working out formulas for capital improvement and building maintenance and how it should be credited to the university infrastructure as some universities have kept up with building maintenance and construction. KBOR has looked at establishing a general education program and a working group to look at the framework of general education of community and four-year universities. They would look at this later as they consider implementation. This will be in addition to K-State 8 and will not conflict with what is already in place. There was more discussion from several senators who encouraged all to keep an eye on this. It was stated that this is a work in progress, and we need to keep abreast of potential changes.

President Littrell reported that the Provost's schedule has changed and he is no longer able to attend the February meeting.

In order to compile and prioritize questions, please discuss the questions, as a caucus, that you would like to be addressed. In this way, each caucus is afforded an opportunity to pose questions specific to their areas. Please submit these to President Littrell by Feb. 15th.

7. Open discussion period for senators as needed

There was discussion on the January 11th memo about classroom protocol for COVID as classes resume. It was stated that classes can move to online if the environment is beneficial for student learning. If ventilation concerns, or improper wearing of masks happens that would be a reason to move your classrooms, meetings and activities online. There is a wide range of interpretations about the messaging. Faculty need to feel supported, and appreciated. By now the university should be more proactive and convey ways to be prepared for the next surge that we are seeing affect our community prior to students returning.

The use of TEVALs in faculty evaluation was raised again. There are fundamental concerns with this due to continued issues with COVID and modality having to change as needed. Also, faculty have had continued health challenges and this affects teaching. It was requested this be brought to the provost for his

information and possible action. It needs to be clear if they are being used for tenure and promotion or for evaluation. This feedback will be shared with the provost.
