The Gardens second annual Daylily Daze went well with over 60 visitors in attendance. The popularity poll among the daylilies blooming in the Gardens was a tie for first with 'Rose F Kennedy' (*above left*) and 'Red Rhapsody' (*right*) as the winners. The votes were really spread out with nine daylilies tying for second place.

Among the bloom display, 'Entwined in the Vine' and 'Starry Skies' tied for top honors. 'Entwined in the Vine' was just added this year to the Gardens as the 2018 Stout Medal Winner. Tied for second place was 'Can You Dig It', 'Orange Grove', 'Africa', and 'Milk Chocolate'. 'Milk Chocolate' was a big hit among the Flint Hills Daylily Society members who hosted the event.

## Another Successful Iris Sale

The Flint Hills Iris Society (FHIS) hosted the annual iris sale at The Gardens on July 27 and is happy to report that for the second year in a row, “we sold out of iris early.” Due to the wet winter and the cool, wet spring, there were fewer iris to sell; however, there were still many award winning varieties available. All of the funds generated at the sale are donated back to the Kansas State University Gardens and the FHIS donation this year should be around \$3600. Some of the funds have already been used to replace iris lost over the winter and will also be used to add 25-30 beautiful new varieties to the collection. The collection includes dwarf, intermediate and tall bearded iris along with spuria and Siberian. The iris beds include: a bed of historical iris, one with re-blooming varieties, another with a large group of Dykes Medal Winners, and the De McGlashon memorial bed which is named after the FHIS founder. We hope you’ll visit the Gardens next May and enjoy these beautiful and hardy perennials in their prime bloom period.


