Graduate Program Directors

[Graduate School Orientation Videos and Survival Guide](#)

New graduate students who were unable to attend Graduate School orientation sessions on January 15 and returning graduate students who need a refresher on requirements, procedures, and resources are encouraged to view video recordings of the Graduate School's orientation sessions. Additionally, all students are encouraged to reference the Graduate Student Survival Guide throughout their graduate career. The video recordings and Survival Guide are also useful resources for graduate faculty who mentor graduate students.

[Graduate Assistantship Forms](#)

As a reminder, all graduate programs and other employing units are to use the updated Graduate Assistantship Appointment forms for new and continuing appointments (changes in responsibilities or distribution of tenths time) effective January 1, 2020. Note the new form requires the following information to be provided: type of appointment, length, stipend and other financial support, list of duties and responsibilities, name of supervisor with contact information, and date when signed appointment form is to be returned and the address to which it is to be returned. The appointment offer should be signed by the department head or an administrator with signature authorization. April 15th Resolution with Council of Graduate Schools

As we approach another graduate recruiting and admissions season, graduate programs are reminded of our institution's participation in the Council of Graduate Schools' (CGS) "[Resolution Regarding Graduate Scholars, Fellows, Trainees and Assistantships](#)" also known as the "April 15 Resolution." The deadline for acceptance of financial aid remains on that date, at midnight Sunday night in your time zone.

Participation in the resolution obliges us to **allow admitted graduate students to consider all offers of financial support through April 15**. In turn, the resolution binds students to their decisions made or held in place after April

15. Over 325 U.S. institutions offering graduate degrees have agreed to abide by this resolution. Your cooperation ensures that both student and programs conduct their admissions in an ethical manner, and that they receive equal treatment and consideration in the financial support decision-making process.

Here are some important aspects of the Resolution:

- The April 15, 2020, deadline applies only to acceptance of an offer of financial support such as a graduate scholarship, fellowship, traineeship, or assistantship.
- It applies only to offers of financial support for the following academic year.
- Although you can send out your offers well before the deadline, prospective graduate students are under no obligation to respond to offers of financial aid prior to April 15.
- Acceptance of an offer of financial support made after April 15, 2020, is conditional upon presentation by the student of written release from any previously accepted offer.
- All offers of financial support should include a copy of or link to the "[April 15 Resolution](#)"

In addition to direct information on the resolution, some explanatory language should be included in all financial support letters. Below is an example of wording that you are free to use in your letter.

Please inform us in writing of your decision no later than April 15, 2020. In accordance with the [Council of Graduate Schools' \(CGS\) resolution](#), you may consider other offers of financial support until the April 15 deadline, but any decision after April 15 is an obligation that you are expected to honor. Likewise, we will honor this offer until the April 15 deadline, after which point it will be rescinded unless you are informed in writing that the deadline for a decision has been extended. Although you are under no obligation to accept this offer prior to April 15, please let us know as soon as you have made a decision so that we may extend offers to other prospective students if possible.

[Complete a brief form to indicate the iBT TOEFL to be used for your graduate program](#)

Educational Testing Service (ETS) is now providing individuals who take the iBT TOEFL two scores: the score for the current test and MyBest™ Score which is composed of the highest scores from each sub-section (reading, listening, speaking, and writing) from all of the test taker's valid iBT TOEFL scores from tests taken in the last two years. The Graduate Council approved the following policy at their December meeting: Graduate Programs may use MyBest™ Score or the most recent iBT TOEFL in assessing language proficiency for admissions of international students. Programs must determine which score to use and apply it consistently for all applicants. This policy change is effective for all international applicants admitted for **Spring 2020 and thereafter**.

To assist the Graduate School with processing recommendations for admission, we ask that each graduate program **[complete a brief form](#)** to indicate which iBT TOEFL score should be used to evaluate international applicants to your program.

This scholarship program was initiated by Timothy Donoghue, former Graduate School dean, as a way to recruit top candidates throughout the United States to K-State graduate programs by offering graduate assistantship packages that are highly competitive. Donoghue Scholarships enhance the maximum package a graduate program can offer to top candidates, making the total package a partnership between the graduate program and the Graduate School. Funding is available for the 2020-2021 academic year to support a maximum of 10 masters and 20 doctoral applicants. The scholarship is renewable for a second academic year. Accepting Applications: ETS Research and Development Internship and Fellowship Programs

The ETS is seeking graduate students enrolled in a doctoral program and early-career scientists who are interested in research opportunities in the following emphasis areas:

- Assessment, measurement and psychometrics: assessment design, validity, fairness, psychometric modeling
- Education: higher education, career and technical education, teacher education, English as a second or foreign language
- Natural language processing and computational linguistics

- Psychology: cognitive psychology, educational psychology, industry-organizational psychology
- Speech recognition and processing
- Statistics and data science: machine learning, causal inference, computational statistics, hierarchical modeling

Summer Internship Program in Research for Graduate Students

Selected interns conduct research under the guidance of mentors at ETS offices in Princeton, N.J. Graduate students who are currently enrolled in full-time doctoral programs in the areas listed above and who have completed a minimum of two years of coursework toward their Ph.D. or Ed.D. prior to the program start date are eligible to apply. **Application Deadline: February 1, 2020**

Postdoctoral Fellowship Program

This program provides opportunities for early-career scholars to work with ETS researchers on a variety of cutting-edge topics, including foundational research as well as research embedded in real-world testing programs. Candidates must have received their doctorate within the past three years. This year, ETS is seeking applications in the following areas of expertise: measurement, psychometrics and statistics; process data modeling and analysis; and artificial intelligence. **Application Deadlines: March 1, 2020** (preliminary) **and April 15, 2020** (final)

Rotary Peace Fellowships

Each year, Rotary selects individuals from around the world to receive fully funded academic fellowships in Peace and Conflict resolution studies at one of our peace centers. These fellowships cover tuition and fees, room and board, round-trip transportation, and all internship/field study expenses. Eligible candidates may not be a Rotarian or related to a Rotarian. Two types of fellowships are available. Rotary will begin accepting applications for the 2020 Rotary Peace Fellowships in February 2020. The [application](#) will be available online. MASTER'S DEGREE FELLOWSHIP

Studies in fields related to peace and conflict resolution and prevention. Requires a minimum of 3 years of related work or volunteer experience and a bachelor's degree. Programs last 15–24 months and require a practical internship of 2–3 months during the academic break. Up to 50 master's fellowships each year.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT CERTIFICATE

A program for those with more extensive experience in peace-related fields (5 or more years related experience required). This is a 3-month (Jan – April or June – August) program in peace and conflict resolution at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, Thailand. This program incorporates 2–3 weeks of field study. Up to 50 certificates awarded each year.

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
