- What was it like coming to K-State? How did you decide to come here?
 Honestly speaking I didn't know much about K-State before applying. As I was busy in my
 Master's thesis I missed the deadlines and this was the only university where I had a chance to
 apply. I am grateful that I got admission here. The project I am working on matches my Research
 interests.
- What has your experience been like so far?
 It's a great experience. This place is quite similar to my hometown Islamabad in terms of cleanliness, peace and calmness. So I didn't find much difference except the winters are much colder than my hometown. I have my own apartment here and I am enjoying my independent life.
- What were some of the big differences when you first arrived (social, academic, weather, etc.)? Was there anything that was really surprising? There are not many Pakistanis at K-State. I am the only one in PhD Electrical and Computer Engineering. My friends in US suggested me not to come here as this is not a high ranking university in Engineering. Before arriving at K-State I heard about hate crimes in Midwest. But when I came here I was surprised to see Muslim women wearing Hijab and nobody teases them. One day a random Christian lady greeted me with "Assalam o Alaikum"... I found it really surprising on the respect I received as a Muslim here unlike what I have heard earlier. The people here are more helpful, friendly, hospitable and welcoming than any of the big cities I have visited like Dallas and San Francisco.
- Was K-State what you expected? Was Manhattan what you expected? Not really. The university from where I came in Pakistan (NUST) is much bigger than K-State College of Engineering. In fact, in my country one department of engineering was comparable to the whole K-State College of Engineering. But in terms of research K-State is far better and that's why I am here. There are no Halal restaurants available in Manhattan which is the biggest problem for me as a Muslim. K-State should take this issue seriously because it has a big Muslim population. Overall I like the peaceful environment and people of K-State.
- Is classroom culture a lot different here?
 Yes. It is much more conducive to learning.

- What do you like about being a student at K-State?
 The Purple Pride. Willie the Wildcat.
- What kinds of things are you involved in on campus?
 Activities arranged by Nation to Nation, Helping International Students, Indian Student Association and International Student Services.
- What do you do for fun in Manhattan?
 I hang out with my international friends. Engage in different activities arranged by the student associations. Go to recreation center.
- If you could have known one thing before moving here, what would it be? Interstate bus services and air travel is very expensive. Halal food options are not available here.
- Do you have any advice for incoming international students?
 I have been to France, Netherlands, Dubai and China for academic and professional reasons but
 I found US the most favorable place to study and work as there is no discrimination between
 locals and internationals. Manhattan is a good place for studies and social activities. But if you are coming just for party it's not Manhattan New York!
- What would you like others to know about being an international student at K-State? Study/Work is just one part of the whole PhD Journey; I learnt many interpersonal skills when I started living and working at K-State. As I am a Pakistani and a Muslim there are a lot of misconceptions in people's mind. So I am more responsible for projecting a real image of my country because I am not only representing myself I am representing my country and my religion too.
- Would you mind sharing a phrase from your native language and what it means?
