In the United States, there were 239,612 cases of breast cancer reported in 2020. It is the leading diagnosed cancer among women, and the second deadliest form of cancer, after lung cancer, affecting women.

- Women ages 40-44 can begin annual breast cancer screenings with imaging
- Genetic and environmental factors can be attributed to breast cancer diagnosis
- Women younger than 40 can be diagnosed with breast cancer
