## LEADERSHIP STUDIES MINOR

K-State's interdisciplinary minor in leadership studies complements any academic major and offers a personal leadership development experience. Through the 15-credit-hour minor, you'll get theoretical knowledge and practical experience.

### CORE COURSES 12 CREDIT HOURS

#### **LEAD 212: Introduction to Leadership Concepts** 3 credit hours

Students will work to understand leadership competencies, theories, and frameworks to further your self-awareness, values, and purpose. We will engage in a collaborative learning community to exercise socially-responsible leadership.

#### **LEAD 350: Culture and Context in Leadership** 3 credit hours

Leadership behavior and practice varies across cultures and contexts. Students will unpack cultural identity, life experience, and world views on leadership relationships. We will practice inclusive leadership through advocacy for social change.

#### **LEAD 405: Leadership in Practice** 3 credit hours

Through practice, we will work to understand the process of facilitating change in self, others, and systems. Students will develop the capacity to exercise leadership to make progress on personal and community issues.

#### **LEAD 450: Senior Seminar in Leadership Studies** 3 credit hours

In this capstone course, we will integrate and apply learning from the minor. We will focus on personal values and current events, analyzing them through the lens of ethical dimensions of leadership.

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# NONPROFIT LEADERSHIP CERTIFICATE

The Nonprofit Leadership Certificate will develop an individual's leadership capacity to better work, serve and lead in nonprofit organizations. Drawing from leadership development theory and best practices, graduates will gain tangible skills in understanding the nonprofit sector and the unique considerations of leading within it.

### Internship Experience

The goal of this experience is to get an overview of the organization and develop a deep understanding of how a single organization functions. The program will support students in locating and obtaining nonprofit internships through advising and notifying students of internship opportunities.

Understanding that every situation is different, internship experiences will be approved on a case-by-case basis. Generally, each internship should be at least 150 hours, spread out over any amount of time and be with a 501(c)(3) or other approved organization.
