### **POSITION DESCRIPTION**

#### Mission

The mission of the Staley School of Leadership is to develop knowledgeable, ethical, caring inclusive leaders for a diverse and changing world.

## LEAD 212: Introduction to Leadership Concepts

Our LEAD 212: Introduction to Leadership Concepts course serves multiple purposes for the benefit of our students, our School, K-State, and the local community.

- *Leadership development*. Through service-learning and other engaged pedagogies, students have the opportunity to learn about, experience, and practice leadership.
- Introduction to the academic minor and programs. Many students who complete LEAD 212 continue to pursue the leadership studies minor and/or participate in one of our many civic engagement programs. This course is our opportunity to invite students into more advanced leadership learning and development opportunities.
- *First-year experience*. Nearly one out of four first-year students enroll in LEAD 212. We put great pride in providing an experience that connects first-year students to Kansas State and the community through leadership education. The intentional decision to divide students into learning communities (12-15 students) is a catalyst for students to feel connected with their peers. These learning communities contribute to student persistence as students work toward degree completion. \*\*please note not all students who enroll in LEAD 212 are first-year students

#### **Class Leader Role Description**

The minimum expectations/responsibilities of LEAD 212 Class Leader includes:

- Attend and actively participate in all training seminars, retreats, weekly class preps, and LEAD 212 class times
- Commit time outside of class to prepare, plan, grade, meet with students, and assist with service-learning and out-of-class activities.
- Attend classes and facilitate weekly learning community sessions both in person (and via zoom as necessary).
- Communicate weekly with students via emails (or other means).
- Serve as role model and mentor for new students.
- Encourage students to fully participate in the university environment.
- Participate in reflection opportunities around teaching/facilitation.
- Additional responsibilities as assigned.

#### Qualifications

The minimum qualifications for LEAD 212 Class Leaders are:

- Good academic (minimum 2.75 cumulative GPA) and disciplinary standing at K-State.
- Will be in at least their third year of college by fall 2023 (based on years in college, not credit hours).
- Understand and believe in the mission of the Staley School of Leadership.
- Have previously taken a LEAD 212 or equivalent introduction to leadership course; and have taken/currently enrolled in LEAD 350 (will have completed LEAD 350 before fall 2023).
- Exhibit responsibility, positive attitude, confidence, flexibility, team orientation, strong energy level, and excellent communication skills.
- Relate well with students and faculty.
- Able to give and receive constructive feedback.
- Demonstrate a desire to learn about leadership.

- Demonstrate willingness to develop self-awareness and teamwork, planning, and facilitation skills.
- Available for training seminars in the spring (2 hours per session, 4 sessions total), individual summer prep work, fall retreat, and weekly class prep sessions throughout fall semester.
- Able to work 6-7 hours per week during the fall 2023 or spring 2024 semester for class time, class prep, grading, and individual meetings, etc.

## **Benefits & Wages**

The benefits of serving as a LEAD 212 Class Leader include:

- The opportunity to gain significant leadership experience and professional development.
- The opportunity to serve as a role model while assisting in the leadership development of first-year students.
- The opportunity to work closely with Staley School faculty and staff.
- Class Leaders will work approximately 6-9 hours per week at \$12 per hour.

# Training

Prior to the start of the fall semester, training will be provided through spring workshops, a Canvas module in the summer, and a fall retreat. See the following page for the training dates/times.

Throughout the fall or spring semester when you teach, LEAD 212 instructors will provide class prep sessions each week to prepare class leaders with the personal, relational, organizational, and facilitator skills needed to effectively lead your learning community. These class prep sessions are to be taken as a course - LEAD 312: Peer Leader Practicum – and can be enrolled in for 0-3 credit hours. Utilizing the high-impact practice of experiential learning, LEAD 212 Class Leaders experience and experiment with the application of concepts through weekly learning. Class prep sessions provide the opportunity for reflection and the development of new understanding of self, others, and leading in community.

# Example Weekly Schedule – fall 2023

The table below represents a typical "week in the life of a Class Leader" during the fall semester. LEAD 212 is a 3-credit hour course, meeting for 50 minutes 3x per week. Two hours will be time spent as a large group in Town Hall, one hour will be spent as a recitation, led by the Class Leader. The time will vary depending on the section you teach and when you attend class prep. This sample schedule is for a MWF class.

**FALL REQUIREMENTS** (\*if you plan to teach in the spring more details will be available next semester):

- In the fall semester you attend the LEAD 212 section you teach (up to 3 hours total) AND a weekly class prep session (1.5 hours total).
- LEAD 212 classes meet as a large lecture in Town Hall on Monday and Wednesday from 9:30am-10:20am, 10:30am-11:20am, and 11:30am-12:20pm, and Tuesday and Thursday from 11:30am-12:45pm. Students will also sign up for a 50-minute recitation which generally corresponds with their large lecture time. Class Leaders will share preferences on which section to teach, and then be assigned to one of the sections after being hired.
- Class Leaders will also enroll in LEAD 312 for a weekly class prep session. Depending on which LEAD 212 class you teach, it will correlate to a class prep session (generally offered on **Monday or Tuesday from 3:30 5:00pm**)
