Director's Notes

Austin Tichenor's adaptation follows Mary Shelley's novel pretty faithfully, and her book is much more than the first ever science-fiction novel. It explores themes that are broad and important.

It considers God's creations vs. the Industrial Revolution, asking what are the moral ramifications of "playing God?" Many recent film versions of the story focus on the loss of humanity by thoughtless users of cell phones, laptops, internet; or other dangers posed by Artificial Intelligence or robots.

The need for family is examined. Victor abandons his friends and family while pursuing his quest, which he, ironically, started because of the death of his father, spurred by a comment from his fiance. The creature, however, is looking for a sense of belonging, family, and community.


Frankenstein and his creation mirror each other, begging the comparison between creator and his creature. Today, many who hear the name of Frankenstein, think of the creature. But that is the name of Victor, the creator. Shelley purposely raises the issue of parentage, and leaves the creature unnamed. Is Victor the father or a morally blind scientist with a God complex? Which of the two bear the most blame?

More than 200 years later, the story also speaks to feminists, for whom Mary Shelley's mother was a radical icon. Victor's fiancé, Elizabeth, brings up key issues in the societal limits and expectations for women as creators.

This connects to what I find most fascinating about the play and the novel; the biographical connections for the author, especially the historical context. Regarding women as creators, the play also can be seen as a metaphor for childbirth and anxiety experienced during pregnancy and with a newborn.

When she started writing *Frankenstein*, Mary Wollstonecraft Godwin, an 18 year old, unwed mother was already using the last name of Shelley, even though the father, Percy Bysshe Shelley was still married to his first wife, Harriet Shelley. In fact, Mary's first child by Shelley had already died.

Her personal life spilled over into the novel, and as I learned more about the context of her life and the world she lived in, I became hooked.

Director's Dramaturgy

With my acting class here at K-State, we have devised a short play- before-the-play, which will be performed some nights in the lobby, pre-show. It is based on the following historical context, which influenced how I directed the play.


At age 16, Mary eloped to Europe with Percy Bysshe Shelley, who was still married. Her premature daughter died 2 weeks after birth. Still suffering from depression, less than a year later, she has a son; William.

In the summer of 1816, traveling with her new son and Percy, Mary visited with Lord Byron and his personal physician, John Polidori. Mary's step-sister, Claire Claremont, whose idea it was to stay near Byron, arrived later (She did not yet know she was pregnant with Byron's child).

The weather was horrible in "the year without a summer" (caused by the eruption of Mt. Tambura which sent ash clouds around the world and blocked the sun). Stuck inside due to incessant rain and frequent lightning storms, the party decided, on Byron's suggestion, to each write a ghost story, as they had been reading aloud from German ghost stories. After struggling for some time to come up with any story, Shelley wrote Frankenstein, which she wrote in her journal, came to her like a waking nightmare.

As a side note, for the same readings, Polidori wrote The Vampyre, which was the first vampire story. These writers were gathered at Byron's rental, the Villa Diodati near Geneva, which was the setting for Frankenstein. Villa Diodati is also where Milton, the author of Paradise Lost, had vacationed and written. Milton and Paradise Lost are often referred to in Frankenstein.

In a room filled with writers, 18 year old Mary Shelley wrote Frankenstein, which would very quickly become a smash.




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

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
