Program Notes

<u>Patience</u>

This very ironically named cello & piano duo is just the opposite of its name. Essentially, this is how I feel when someone tells me to be patient; white-knuckled and overdramatic. Its incessantly repeating piano notes and wild molto crescendos depict the feeling of uneasiness and great tension.

<u>Polydouri</u>

This work for string orchestra is inspired by the incredible life and tragic death of Maria Polydouri. Polydouri was a Greek poet who lived from 1902-1930. She lived a life rich with suffering; from the early death of her parents, her tragic love affair with the Greek poet Karyotakis, and her own young death to tuberculosis, she experienced much pain throughout her short life. However, though she suffered greatly, she also lived a deeply meaningful and proud life. She remained a devout activist for women's rights, excelled in her many hobbies, and wrote some of the most influential and profound Greek poetry of the 20th century. In fact, she wrote her greatest poems while slowly withering away in a tuberculosis sanatorium. Much of her poetry is, of course, quite bleak, but Polydouri accomplished something only done by a few in each generation: she transformed her pain into a source of beauty. Her final works demonstrate a level of acceptance that can only be achieved by those who truly understand the purpose of suffering.

Because I was so deeply inspired by the story of Maria Polydouri, I chose to tell that story by writing my largest composition yet. I was inspired by the works of Max Richter to create slowly expanding atmospheric sections with intangible meter and contrasted them with my own sections of chaotic fortissimo. To capture the depth of Polydouri's experience, I visit the extremes of musical expression, from triple piano all the way to triple forte.

Salvation Must be Earned

This piece was improvised, rather than written, for my final project in my electronic studio class. I had been experimenting with additive synthesis and decided to combine what I learned with my existing cello skills in an improvisational piece of music. Like any other composer, I tend to write what I am feeling, and the bleakness and turbulence of this piece speaks to what I was feeling at the time.

Epicenter

This work for solo organ, titled "Epicenter", captures the feeling of belonging and freedom. It is based on the minimalist works of Philip Glass, and as such, it uses the same ostinato for almost the entire piece, gradually building in intensity and excitement.

This piece was born of my desire to write something cute for woodwinds. Naturally, the cutest thing I could think of was the Fennec Fox, which promptly became the theme of this piece.
