Many graduate students today find themselves, in addition to; juggling work and school also juggle parenting. I myself know this all to well being a mother of a 7-year old girl and a 31/2 year old boy. Quality time is important for both the parent and the child, since neither of you will get these growing years back. Therefore, it is imperative we take advantage of all the time we have. Here are some practical tools I have created and implemented in my life that can help a parent stay on task and a child learn, all while spending time together.

Homework Together Time: (Key – Make it fun!)

On nights that both you and your child have homework, do it together. Sit at a table and work on your assignments simultaneously.

Hint: Make sure you get the child started by reviewing the directions and making sure, they understand what is being asked of them. Doing this will limit multiple interruptions. Also, start homework time off by taking breaks every 10-20 minutes since children may often need more clarity with their assignments, affirmation that they are doing a good job, or simply an attention

break (depending on the age of the child). You can even make a game out of it by having a race to see how many paragraphs you can read in 20 minutes or whatever you want just have fun with it.

When a child sees his or her parent working hard they may feel encouraged to work just as diligently knowing they have a support system in place.

<u>Mommy / Daddy and Me Time:</u> (Key: Keep your promises)

Sometimes working alongside your child may not be the best working method for some parents. Yet, spending time with your child is still a necessity for healthy living. So, make arrangements with your child to have a special time together doing something they enjoy after you complete your work. Let them know that if they are cooperative in letting you finish, some or all of your assignment, you will dedicate a special time just for them doing something enjoyable.

Hint: Keep your promise! Even if you were unable to finish an assignment before your scheduled mommy / daddy and me time, spend the time anyway. Children need consistency, and need to know they can trust you. Simply note in your mind for next time, the need to adjust fun time according to your workload.

Realistically, this may or may not work for some students, and you may need to resort to only working while they are sleeping (which comes in handy and works very well too.) Yet, ultimately, it is important to keep your child as included as you can in your academic career. Not only is it a positive testament to them about working hard in school, but it also reassures them that they are important to you. Remember it is never too early to introduce your child to books; so even if you have an infant let them see that "mommy / daddy read" and encourage literacy in your child. Being a parent and a student is not always the easiest thing, yet, it can be what you make it, so take the time to make it an enjoyable journey.

We are writing to inform you of a wonderful opportunity being offered to CSP Graduate Students. Recently, the Office of Greek Affairs began the process of community discovery and strategic planning. As a part of this process we will use focus groups to assess many different groups including faculty, staff, students, and fraternity and sorority chapters.

We are looking for 10 CSP Graduate Students to facilitate the focus groups, and gain valuable experience working with the Office of Greek Affairs on a project of this importance. Focus group facilitators will work closely with Dan Bureau – past President for the Association of Fraternity Advisors - the strategic planning facilitator hired by Greek Affairs, to prepare for the focus groups, and will be instrumental in assessing the Greek Community and helping to create positive and long term change.

Training for the focus group facilitators will take place Friday January 19th at 7:00 PM and run for approximately 1.5-2 hours in the K-State Union. Focus Groups will be held Sunday January 21st in the K-State Union. The day will be split up into 2 sessions. The first session is 9:00 am - 1:00 pm, the second session is 1:00 pm - 5:00 pm, and lunch will be provided at 1:00 pm for the first session and 12:00 - 12:45 pm for the second session facilitators. Facilitators will also receive a \$25.00 gift certificate

to the Union Bookstore from Greek Affairs for each session worked. This type of opportunity to work with Fraternities and Sororities does not present itself very often, and it is a great experience to have going into the job search process. We will be accepting facilitators on a first come first serve basis.



The Thesis and Dissertation Support Group held their first meeting Friday, November 10th. In order to accommodate more schedules and to allow for some variety please make note of the following dates:


