
CERTIFICATE IN GLOBAL HEALTH, MEDICINE, AND SOCIETY

The certificate prepares students to examine health issues, at the global and local scale, by integrating the perspectives of the medical humanities and the social sciences of health. The certificate is geared toward students who are interested in healthcare as a holistic and human-centered problem. The certificate is a specially valuable complement to the education of pre-medical student, and those who want to pursue careers in global or public health, plan to seek a degree in medical anthropology, medical humanities, law, science and technology, or seek future work in the health care industry, health advocacy, and/or health care policy.

Getting Started

Declare your intent to complete the certificate by filling out the appropriate form in the SASW Department office (204 Waters Hall). Once registered, complete at least 15 credits of the appropriate course work (9-credits must be above the 300-level) from the list of approved courses. Maintain a minimum of a 2.5 GPA across the courses that count toward the certificate (courses cannot be taken pass/fail).

How it Works

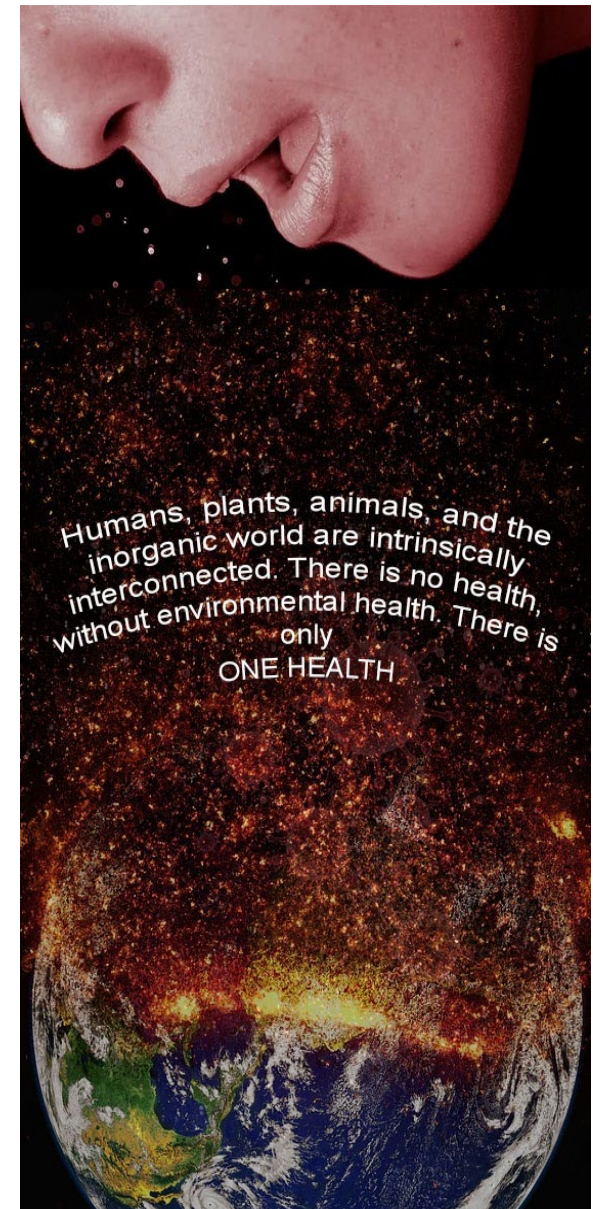
Complete a minimum of 5 different courses from two categories: 1) CORE: 3 hours from either of the two Core in Global Health, Medicine, and Society classes; 2) ELECTIVES - 12 hours from Electives, focusing on global medicine, health, and society from a humanistic or social scientific perspective. Electives must be taken in at least two different academic programs
