# THE LAWS THE MYTHS THE HARD TRUTHS

**"Kids are watching pornography: Here's how to think about it."** We examine some of these contemporary headlines and what the research can and cannot tell us.



## We apply a spotlight to the circumstances, laws, and layers of sex crimes and society's response to them

A long history of what gets defined and prosecuted as "sex crimes" reveals a myriad of offenses with inconsistent underpinnings. Similarly, social reaction to sexual offenders demonstrate a history of harshness exemplified by sexual psychopath laws of the 1930s, while ignoring other harmful acts often overlooked or brushed under the rug. Finally, contemporary practices such as "up-skirting" and "revenge porn" are often not considered harmful to victims. This class takes a critical, thoughtful, and fully sociological look.
