EXECUTIVE BRANCH

The Executive Branch is headed by the Student Body President and Vice President. With the Chief of Staff, the President and VP appoint Cabinet members to help them work on specific initiatives for campus. Cabinet members often work on specific projects and collaborate with campus administrators. The Executive Branch office is located in 116 Student Union.

LEGISLATIVE BRANCH

The Legislative Branch is led by the Speaker of Student Senate and the Speaker Pro Tempore. They oversee Student Senate, which is comprised of 60 Student Senators. Each Senator serves on a Standing Committee and is a member of a college caucus. The Legislative Branch's main job is to allocate SGA's budget, which comes from the Student Services Fee. The Parliamentarian keeps parliamentary procedure during all Student Senate meetings. The Legislative Branch office is located in 117 Student Union.

JUDICIAL BRANCH

The Judicial Branch is run by the Attorney General and Deputy Attorney General. The Judicial Branch is composed of three different judicial boards. One of the their main jobs is to oversee violations of the Student Code of Conduct and provide sanctions that help the violators grow past their incidents. The Judicial Branch office is located in 118 Student Union.

SGA CONSTITUTION

The SGA Constitution establishes Student Government and serves as general guideline for SGA. The Constitution outlines the basic structure of each branch and the authority that each branch has. It also contains the rights that students at K-State hold. Amendments to the SGA Constitution require a 3/4 vote of Student Senate and 2/3 of the College Caucuses to approve.

SGA BY-LAWS

The SGA By-Laws specify the duties and responsibilities of SGA members. Each branch has a dedicated section in the By-Laws. Each section lists the committees or groups that report to each branch. In addition, the By-Laws contain the SGA Judicial Code and the rules for the SGA Emerging Leaders Program. Amendments to the SGA By-Laws require a 2/3 vote of Student Senate to approve.

SGA STATUTES

The SGA Statutes are the largest of the governing documents and are a collection of a variety of different documents. This includes all Student Services Fee contracts and funding regulations, the SGA Elections Regulations Code, and the Student Senate Standing Rules. Amendments to the Statutes require a majority vote to approve.

Student Senate is made up of representatives from each academic college. The student senators from each college are called a "caucus." Each Caucus is led by a Caucus Leader.



BILLS

One of the main types of legislation. Student Senate passes Bills to take an action. Bills either allocate funding or make amendments to SGA Governing Documents. Bills take two weeks to pass in Senate- they are introduced one week; are referred to a Standing

Committee; and then voted on in Senate. Bills always require a roll call vote in Senate.

RESOLUTIONS

The other main type of legislation. Senate passes Resolutions to take a position on an issue. Resolutions are typically sent to campus administrators or people off-campus to inform them of SGA's stance. Normal resolutions take two weeks to pass, but they are voted on through a hand vote or voice vote.

COMMENDATIONS

A special type of resolution. Senate passes commendations to congratulate individuals on their accomplishments. Commendations only take one week to pass and they are passed unanimously by Senate.

APPOINTMENTS

Another special type of resolution. Senate passes appointments to approve someone serving in a position. Appointments only take one week to pass and are typically approved unanimously.


MINOR ALLOCATIONS

A special type of funding bill. If a group requests less than \$1,000, their funding bill is considered minor. A minor allocation is not read in its entirety in front of Senate, nor is it debated. All minor allocations can be approved at one time, and they are typically approved unanimously. KANSAS STATE

LEGISLATION NUMBERS

A Bill or Resolution receives a number when the Senate Operations committee reviews it. The first two numbers are the SGA term, and the last number is just the number of Bills or Resolutions for that year. For example Bill 19/20/05 was the fifth bill in the 19-20 SGA term.

RECOMMENDATIONS

When a committee is referred a piece of legislation, they have the opportunity to review and discuss the legislation. They can make amendments or changes in committee if they desire. The committee must then either send the legislation back to Senate with a recommendation or hold the legislation. They have three recommendations to pick from:

- Favorably
- Unfavorably
- No recommendation

Whatever the committee decides will be printed on the Student Senate agenda for that week so Senators know what the committee thought about the legislation.

AUTHORING LEGISLATION

Any student at K-State can be the author on a piece of legislation, but one of the authors must be a member of the Legislative Branch of KSU SGA. Committees can also be the authors of bills.

SPONSORING LEGISLATION

Any student at K-State can be a sponsor on a piece of legislation.

SUBMITTING LEGISLATION

Legislation must be reviewed by the Senate Operations Committee before it can go on the agenda. To be reviewed, the Legislation must be uploaded to OrgCentral under the "Submit to Senate Operations" folder. Legislation is due by 11:59 PM on Mondays.





MAKING A MOTION

Any person with speaking rights can make a motion. Typically, the Speaker will ask if there are any motions. Then, a person will raise their hand and wait to be recognized by the Speaker. Once called on, the person simply says: "I move that _____" and a motion is made. Motions can be made at almost any time, sometimes even when considering other motions. See the list of motions below for some commonly made motions, as well as when to use them.

SECONDING A MOTION

After a motion is made, it must be seconded to be considered. Any person with speaking rights can second a motion simply by calling out "second" after someone else makes a motion. You do not have to wait to be called on to second a motion, and you cannot second your own motion. If a motion does not get seconded quickly, the speaker will typically ask for any seconds. If there is still not a second, the motion dies and is not considered.

CONSIDERING A MOTION

Once a motion is made and seconded, it can be considered by the body. The way a motion is considered depends on the type of motion made. For example, a motion to approve the minutes will automatically happen; the minutes are approved once the motion is seconded. However, motions to consider bills or resolutions will require the author of that piece of legislation to come before Senate and read the legislation in its entirety.





DEBATING A MOTION

Almost all motions can be debated, but there are some exceptions. There are two different types of debate- positive and negative. Positive debate is debate that agrees with the original motion, while negative debate disagrees and encourages a "no" vote on the motion. For fairness, the Speaker alternates the type of debate, between positive and negative. If it is legislation that is being debated, the author of that legislation gets the first right to debate it. All members of SGA with speaking rights can debate a motion, and individuals can defer their speaking rights to non-members, if those individuals wish to debate. There are rules and motions to limit debate, but debate on a single motion can last for as long as necessary.

VOTING ON A MOTION

Motions must be voted on by the body to be approved. Only voting members of Senate can vote on motions. Depending on the type of motion, the Speaker or chair will ask for a specific type of voting. Votes can be through a hand raise or a voice vote. Most legislation requires a voice vote- the Speaker pro tempore will say a senator's name, and that senator will respond with their answer. The Speaker pro tempore asks all Senators for their answers in alphabetical order. There are four options when doing a voice vote- yes, no, pass, or abstain. Yes or no answers are self-explanatory, but pass and abstain work a little differently. When a Senator passes, they are skipped and their name is put at the end of the vote; a Senator might do this if they are unsure how to vote and they want to see how others are voting. A Senator may only pass once and then must cast a vote. An "abstain" vote means that a Senator is choosing not to vote on an issue; Senators typically only do this if there is a conflict of interest. For example, a Senator may abstain if the vote is for a funding bill for a club that they are a member of. Sometimes, motions are grouped together in "bulk roll call." This just means that all of the bills will be voted on together. Senators can say "yes to all" in these bulk roll call votes, or they can still vote individually on each bill by saying yes or no to the respective bills. Motions require either a majority (51%) or a super majority (66%) to pass. If a motion passes, it then goes into effect.





1. I move to approve the minutes.

This motion is used to approve last meeting's minutes, or notes. The speaker usually asks for people to make this motion.

2. I move that we consider Resolution/Bill #____.

Bills or Resolutions must be moved before they are considered. A motion to consider a bill must include the bill or resolution number.

3. I move to extend the speaker's time by ____ minutes.

Speakers have a time limit on how long they can speak or answer questions. If they require more time to speak, someone must make a motion to extend the speaker's. People usually move for a small amount of time, such as five or ten minutes.

4. I move that we unanimously approve this resolution.

A motion to unanimously approve a resolution is used only on commendations or approval of appointments. A motion to approve a resolution unanimously means that all of Senate agrees with the resolution, and there is no voting on the resolution like usual.

5. I move the previous question.

If there has been substantial debate on a motion, someone may move the previous question. The previous question means that debate is closed and that a vote is immediate.

6. I move that the author be allowed to summarize.

The first time a bill is read in front of Senate, it is required to be read in its entirety. However, for longer bills, anyone can make a motion allowing the author to summarize. Then they are able to explain the legislation and not read it word for word.





7. I move to hold Bills ___, ___, and ____ for bulk roll call.

If there is a series of bills all centered around one topic, they can be held for bulk roll call. This means that the bills can all be voted on at once, instead of separately. This is usually done to speed up the voting process if Senate is running long.

8. I move to special order Bill ____.

In Senate, a bill must go through a two week process before it passes. The first week it is introduced, and the second week it is voted on. A special order means that a bill will be voted on the same night it is introduce. This is usually done when it is imperative that a bill must pass soon.

9. I move to amend Bill ____.

A bill can be amended during Senate. After making this motion, the Speaker will provide you with a short form to fill out, so the amendment can be added to the bill.

10. Point of Inquiry

If you have a question for the Speaker, raise your hand and say "Point of Inquiry."

11. Point of Parliamentary Procedure

If you have any questions for the Speaker about Robert's Rules of Order, raise your hand and say "Point of Parliamentary Procedure."

12. Point of Order

If you notice that some of the rules of Parliamentary Procedure are not being followed, call out Point of Order. When the Speaker calls on you, notify the Speaker of what rule has been broken.

Students with legitimate complaints have a right to petition a judicial board and have their case heard. To file a case with the Judicial Branch, contact the Attorney General, Hattie Polson, or fill out the form below. Once a case is started, the appropriate board will receive the information and contact the student regarding further action.

Generally, University jurisdiction to adjudicate complaints and to impose sanctions under this code shall be limited to misconduct that occurs on University property, at University-sponsored activities, or behavior which intentionally or recklessly interferes with the operation of the University or with University-sponsored activities, including, but not limited to, studying, teaching, research, University administration, fire, police, or emergency services.

All complaints must be received no later than twenty (20) class days after the alleged misconduct occurs or is discovered. A copy of this report will be emailed to you for your records. Please refer to the <u>SGA Judicial Code</u> for additional information on the judicial process.

- 1. Your information
- 2. The urgency of the situation
- 3. Information surrounding the incident
- 4. Involved parties
- 5. Alleged violations
- 6. Any and all evidence such as photos, emails, texts, etc.
