SPECIAL SPEAKER

Bill Snyder

The architect of the "greatest turnaround in college football history," Bill Snyder returned to the sidelines in 2009 with hopes of revitalizing a program that he once built, piece by piece, into a national force. And, after seven seasons back in charge, he has done just that — and then some.

Over the past seven years under Snyder, K-State has totaled 57 victories, an average of 8.1 wins per year; advanced to six-straight bowl games; won a conference championship in 2012; and finished third or better in the ultracompetitive Big 12 Conference in three of the last five seasons. However, the recent success should come as no surprise as Snyder took over a program in 1989 that was in the midst of a 27-game winless streak and turned it into a national contender that advanced to 11-straight bowl games and tallied six 11-win seasons over a seven-year stretch.

Turning around a program twice is one of the biggest reasons why Snyder became just the fourth person all-time to be inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame as an active coach. The man who said "No" to those who said it couldn't be done in Manhattan, Kansas, was enshrined in 2015 — Snyder's 24th year at the helm of the program and perhaps one of his greatest in-season coaching jobs.

Snyder led K-State to 11-straight bowl berths between 1993 and 2003, making K-State one of only seven programs in the nation to appear in the postseason every year during that stretch. During that span, Snyder's Wildcats won nearly 80 percent of their games, chalking up 109 victories — a staggering average of nearly 10 wins per season — and making K-State the nation's second-winningest program over that period.

SESSION SPEAKERS

Mick Charney

Mick Charney is a true advocate and genuine role model of teaching excellence in higher education. Charney, an associate professor of architecture at Kansas State University, received both his Bachelor of Science and Master of Architecture from the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign, and his doctorate in art history from Northwestern University. He has been teaching some version of a large introductory architectural history survey class for nearly 37 years. He has received numerous teaching awards, including the 2005 Kansas State University Presidential Award for Outstanding Undergraduate Teaching and the 2014-2015 Coffman Chair of the University Distinguished Teaching Scholars. His research in the scholarship of teaching and learning includes a total of more than 60 scholarly sessions chaired, workshops conducted, papers delivered and posters presented at various regional, national and international conferences. His other research interests include modern architecture and the life and work of Frank Lloyd Wright, and the merit of the lecture as an effective teaching strategy.

Emily Drigenberg

Emily Dringenberg teaches engineering problemsolving and advises students in general engineering. Dringenberg is a K-State graduate in mechanical engineering. She received her master's degree in industrial engineering and her doctorate in engineering education, both from Purdue University.

Amy Betz

Amy Betz is an assistant professor and received her doctorate in mechanical engineering from Columbia University. Her research interests are convective heat transfer, multiphase systems, microfluidics, microfabrication and interfacial transport phenomena.

Assessing Cognitive Flexibility in Undergraduate Physiology Students

Ashley Rhodes and Tim Rozell

Kansas State University

TO THE

Cognitive flexibility refers to the ability to assimilate previously learned information and concepts in order to generate novel solutions to new problems. This skill is crucial for success in ill-structured domains (e.g. biology, physiology and medicine) where concepts are simultaneously required for understanding a complex problem consisting of patterns or combinations of concepts not consistently used or needed across all examples. In this study, cognitive flexibility of undergraduate physiology students was tested using a validated instrument — student approaches to learning, or SAL. Preliminary results indicate that students who use elaborative techniques when studying, such as constructing their own meaning from information and integrating new information with what they have previously learned, score higher on exams compared to students who rely on memorization strategies.

Ashley Rhodes currently teaches undergraduate biology and physiology courses at Kansas State University. Her work provides unique perspectives on student learning issues within and between the beginning courses, middle level and upper division courses. Rhodes has bachelor's and master's degrees in animal science and a doctorate in curriculum and instruction.

Tim Rozell teaches in the department of animal science and industry at Kansas State University. He teaches Anatomy and Physiology, Physiology of Lactation, Molecular Reproductive Endocrinology and Lambing. Rozell has a Bachelor of Science and a Master of Science from the University of Missouri and a doctorate from Washington State University. He completed a postdoctoral fellowship at the University of Iowa.

B2 Designing and Faculty Training for the Next Generation Classroom Romana Hughes

Texas Christian University

TCU opened a new interdisciplinary building housing 10 new classrooms, 15 student rooms, labs and study spaces. The building reflects TCU's Vision in Action: The Academy of Tomorrow. One directive for the academy is to prepare faculty to teach in these new facilities. TCU designed and delivered a new faculty development program introducing faculty to various student-centered pedagogy, new classroom technology, student success strategies and measuring student learning. This discussion will look at the development of the new building, faculty preparation to teach in the new space and lessons learned.

Romana Hughes is the assistant provost of educational technology and faculty development, with primary duties including oversight of the Koehler Center for Teaching Excellence, managing a robust, multifaceted professional development program for TCU. Hughes works with course designs intersecting student-centered learning and excellence in the use of technology in the learning environment. She has 27 years of higher education experience, 17 years in faculty development and 10 years teaching experience at the university level.





KONZA PRAIRIE

The Konza Prairie is a 13-square-mile expanse of native grasslands with creeks, native trees and wildlife, including deer and bison. Most of the Konza was once part of the Dewey Cattle Ranch and is located about 6 miles south of Manhattan. In the 1970s, the Nature Conservancy purchased the property and it is

now managed by Kansas State University as a research area to study the tallgrass prairie ecosystem. Limestone outcrops characterize the landscape, with grasses as the dominant plants of the prairie — big bluestem, Indiangrass, little bluestem and switchcross are in abundance.



FLINT HILLS DISCOVERY CENTER

In the heart of downtown Manhattan, the Flint Hills Discovery Center celebrates the importance of the geology, ecology and cultural history of the Flint Hills. The facility opened April 14, 2013, with exhibits designed to encourage visitors to explore firsthand the many special places with the Flint Hills region of Kansas. The center has meticulously crafted

and developed exhibits and programs to promote intergenerational education and inspire a lifelong commitment to learning. At the multimedia Immersive Experience Theater, one can feel the wind rush through the hair, watch smoke from a prairie fire and learn the story of this region of Kansas.



BILL SNYDER FAMILY STADIUM

Named for K-State's beloved legendary head football coach, Bill Snyder Family Stadium comes alive every fall with excitement and purple pride as students, faculty and fans gather to cheer on the Wildcats. The 250,000-square-foot West Stadium Center opened in fall 2013, featuring new

concessions, restrooms and ticket offices. The Terrace Level features the Ahearn Fund Student Athlete Performance Table and the Tailgate Terrace. The second, third and fourth levels have outdoor suite, club and loge seating.



VANIER FAMILY FOOTBALL COMPLEX

The original Vanier Sports Complex was replaced with a brand-new facility before the start of the 2015 football season. This new complex includes a massive new strength and conditioning center, new sports medicine

and hydrotherapy equipment, a team theater, customized and centrally located locker room, student-athlete lounge spaces and expansive meeting rooms.
